GERMANY SEE 285 FILMS

Washington.—(U.P.)—During 1931 there were 285 motion pictures shown in Germany. Commerce Department reports of Berlin state. Of this number, 145 films were produced in Germany and 140 by foreign companies. The United States ranked first as an exporter of foreign-made films, with a total of 64.
