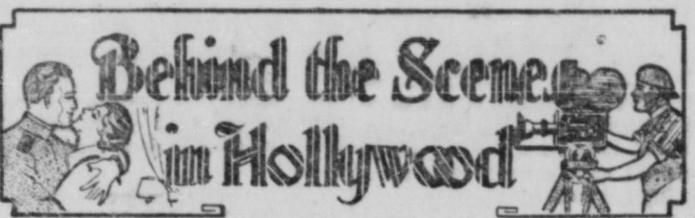

**TEACHER URGES MOUNTAIN PLAY**

Marion, Va., Apr. 7. — (U.P.) — Professor I. C. Greer, of Boone, N. C., who has, besides teaching a mountain school for many years, become, through lifelong study one of the foremost authorities on the music of the natives of the southern mountains, believes that a "Mountain Passion Play," modeled to some extent on that of Oberammergau, Germany, should be established in the hills.  
"I don't mean that I think the Mountain Passion Play" should be of a religious nature," Greer commented while visiting his relative, Mayor R. T. Greer, of Marion, "but that some organization or society interested in preserving our native folk lore should endow a mountain theater. It might be an amphitheater."  
"Hundreds — thousands! — of people would visit the mountains each year to see plays portraying the native speech and the native songs of the people who are now the world's most nearly connecting link with life as it was in the days of Elizabethan England, and they would like to see the mountain people at their daily work," Greer said. He pointed out that some 3,000 people came from many states last

**FAMOUS FLIER HURT IN CRASH**

**Frank Hawks, Speed Aviator Injured; Plane Falls To Ground**

Worcester, Mass., April 7. — (U.P.) — Frank Hawks, internationally famous aviator, holder of many distance flight records including United States transcontinental marks, was injured, possibly critically, in a crash at the airport near here today.  
Hawks had fulfilled a lecture date before Worcester Boy Scouts last night, and had intended to return immediately to New York. He deferred his start until this morning, however, because of the maddening condition of the field. He had difficulty in taking off this morning and was said to have fallen after having arisen only a few feet.  
Hawks was taken to Memorial hospital. It was feared he had sustained a fractured skull.  
Hawks flew here from Detroit yesterday in three hours and 55 minutes, and his big plane nosed over in landing. His handling of the craft averted an accident at that time, however. An escort plane, piloted by John W. Lashell, Whitinsville aviator, was hot so fortunate and stood on its nose on the muddy field.  
Speaking last night at a Boy Scout gathering in Worcester, Hawks stressed the need of faster and fool-proof planes.  
Though Hawks' condition was not believed critical, he was suffering considerable pain and Worcester hospital authorities refused to permit anyone to see him. In addition to the head injuries, he hurt his hands, probably in shielding himself in the crash.  
Unable to get his heavily loaded low wing monoplane into the air from a soggy field, he crashed into a stone wall on the outskirts of the airport.  
The plane was smashed, but did not take fire.  
Unconscious and suffering from severe head and face lacerations, the noted aviator was extricated with little difficulty by airport attaches.  
Hawks was attempting to start for New York.  
En route to the city hospital at Worcester, a few miles away, Hawks regained consciousness and his name was not placed on the danger list when he arrived. Doctors said the seriousness of his condition could not be definitely established until X-ray pictures had been taken.
