NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS
Notice is hereby given that Monday, May 2, 1932 will be the last day to pay your fall installment of taxes. The county treasurer's office will be open from 8 A. M. to 4 P. M. during the tax paying season. All taxes not paid by that time will become delinquent and a 10% penalty will be added. Those who have bought or sold property and wish a division of taxes are asked to come in at once.

Call on the Auditor for errors and any corrections. The Treasurer can make no corrections.
The Treasurer will not be responsible for the penalty of delinquent taxes resulting from the omission of what property they desire to pay, in whose name it may be found, in what township or corporation it is situated.

Persons owing delinquent taxes should pay them at once, the law is such that there is no option left for the Treasurer but enforce the collection of delinquent taxes.
The annual sale of delinquent lands and lots will take place on the second Monday in February 1933 at 10 A. M.

Country orders will not be paid to anyone owing delinquent taxes. All persons are warned against them. No receipts or checks will be held after expiration of time, as the new depository law requires the Treasurer to make daily deposits.
