CLOSE CONTESTS MARK ELECTION

FARLEY TAKES BIG LEAD IN 4TH DISTRICT

Whom Manufacturer Is
Winner In Congressional
Nomination

HEAD PILES UP HIGHER

BULLETIN

James I. Farley had an unofficial majority of 6,800 votes in Adams County early this morning. Almost every precinct had reported unofficially. Farley carried DeKalb county by more than 1,500.

Port Wayne, May 4. — James I. Farley, of Auburn, Ind., appeared to be the winner in the seven-district race for the Democratic nomination for congress from the fourth district. Farley swept Allen county and carried his own county by a nice vote.

A Gottschalk of Berne, won Adams county but fell short in the county where James Adams, of Adams City, led the field of several counties. Adams also carried Noble, Adams and LaGrange counties but by a sufficient amount to offset the tremendous vote Farley piled in Port Wayne.

Farley carried Steuben county by a vote and received a fair share in Allen county. He was expected to win third place in the race. Smiley, Riddle, and Farley all failed to get a vote.

Political leaders of Port Wayne tonight that Farley would win the nomination by more than 1,500, provided there were no late upsets.

Gottschalk drew a good general election but fell short in Allen county. A final lineup probable will be Farley, Adams, Gottschalk, Riddle, Farley, Farrar and Smiley.

Thompson carried his home county by about 1,800 votes. Wells was trailing Muselman in Adams county by about 500 votes with more than 13 precincts to be heard from.

FAST TIME IS DEFEATED HERE

Citizens Turn Down Proposal To Turn Clocks Ahead This Year

Daylight saving time in Decatur appeared to be doomed.

With half the city's precincts reported the central standard time advocates were ahead by 185 votes. The three precincts which were reported early this morning had a large part of Decatur's vote and there was little hope of the fast timers gaining enough to enforce the ordinance.

Several weeks ago local business men petitioned the council to repeal the fast time ordinance and after a week or two of discussion it was decided to hold a referendum.

Much interest centered around the voting and both sides claimed a victory. As a result of the majority favoring central standard time, the clocks in Decatur will remain unchanged during the summer months this year and the ordinance will be repealed.

HOGG DEFEATS DR. H. O. JONES

G. O. P. Incumbent Snows Adams County Candidate Under Easily

Port Wayne, May 3.—Congressman David Hogg seeking renomination on the Republican ticket appeared late tonight to have won every one of the eight counties from his opponent, Dr. Harry O. Jones, Berne, who made the race as a wet Republican. Hogg carried Allen county by approximately 2,000 votes, upsetting the hopes of the Jones forces who had claimed that county by from 5,000 to 7,500.

Jones was beaten in almost every precinct of his own county, Adams, and there was little hope expressed that he would carry a single county. The Hogg vote in Allen county was a decided upset. A concerted effort had been made for Dr. Jones in that county and his boosters claimed the county by a big majority.

The Republican vote was light throughout the eight counties of the district. Hogg won Wells county by more than two to one; he carried Adams county two to one; Allen county by 2,000 or more; DeKalb by better than two to one; LaGrange by a scant majority; Steuben by a big plurality; Noble by more than 1,000. Whitney was slow coming in, but Jones was far behind in the scattered precincts.

Hogg, branded as a dry will be a candidate against the Democratic nominee in the general election next November and in all probability the Democrat will be a wet.

Delegates Are Named

Ten of the McNutt pledged delegates won places in the Democratic election for delegates to the state convention yesterday. The eleventh member of the delegation, while not pledged is understood to be favorable to the candidacy of McNutt.

Those named included, Anton Thieme, Dr. J. W. Vivard, Dr. J. C. Grandstaff, David J. Schwartz, Daniel Ruple, Edwin Beer, Dick Heller, O. L. Vance, and August Heiman.

DREDGE CAUSE RECESSES TO SEPTEMBER 12

Special Judge Kister To Resume Hearing in Fall; Exception To Ruling

ONE WITNESS TAKES STAND

Following an hour's session Monday afternoon, the Wabash dredge case was adjourned until Monday, September 12, by Special Judge Henry Kister.

Judge Kister arrived in the city about two o'clock and held a conference with attorneys Henry B. Heller, county attorney, C. J. Lutz, chief of counsel for the remonstrators and George Whitaker of Redkey, chief counsel for the petitioners.

Jonas Neuenschwander of Vera Cruz was called as a witness and concluding his testimony Judge Kister announced that court would adjourn until next September.

The Adams county council refused to make an appropriation for \$1,200 for the special judge in the case. The special judge must be paid out of county funds and the state later reimburses the county for the amount.

Judge Kister took exception to the council's attitude and stated that he regretted the case could not be brought to a conclusion.

Attorneys in the case would not venture a guess how long it would take to complete the hearing.

The case opened last September and most of the time the sessions of court were held in the Knights

FARRAR FALLS FROM HIS AUTO

Congressional Candidate Suffers Concussion of Brain In Fall

Alfred Farrar, Geneva, was still unconscious late last night following an injury he received when he fell from his automobile early Tuesday night. His condition was regarded as serious.

Alfred Farrar, Geneva, Democratic candidate for congress from the Fourth Indiana district was seriously injured at 6 o'clock tonight when he fell from the rear seat of his automobile and was dragged along the road for several feet. Mr. Farrar suffered a concussion of the brain. The extent of his injury will not be known for several hours, it was said by his attending physician.

The accident occurred west of Berne. Mr. Farrar had gotten into his automobile and started for Geneva after visiting a precinct west of his home town.

He was leaning against the door of his automobile, when the door opened. He fell to the road and before the automobile was stopped he was dragged along for several feet.

He was rushed to a Geneva physician's office and later was removed to his home. Preliminary examination failed to reveal a fracture, but he suffered a severe concussion.

ALL PRECINCTS ARE NEEDED TO DECIDE RACES

Phil Sauer Appears To Have Won Commissioner's Race By 12

It was some primary for the Democrats of Adams county. More than 5,200 Democratic voters went to the polls Tuesday and as the results poured in late Tuesday night and early this morning hundreds of interested people watched the outcome with interest.

Several of the contests were in doubt until the last precincts were reported. Phil Sauer won the nomination for commissioner of the first district over August Gallemeier by 12 votes. The vote was close throughout the night and with Decatur 3-B out, Sauer led by six votes. He picked up six more votes in the third ward and unless there are some errors, he is the nominee from the first district.

Thirman A. Gottschalk collected about 2,500 votes in the county and was far in the lead in this county for the congressional nomination. Frank Thompson, Bluffton, won the nomination for joint representative of Adams and Wells counties over C. H. Muselman, Berne publisher.

Ed A. Bosse was nominated for prosecuting attorney by almost 800 votes. Herman H. Myers was second with a total in 33 of the 34 precincts with 1,153. In the same number of precincts Nathan Nelson, incumbent was third with a total of 1,249. Hubert McClenahan was fourth with 519 votes. Bosse's vote in 33 precincts was 2,087.

Glen Cowan collected more than 2,200 votes and won the nomination for auditor over Fred T. Schürger, Rudolph Schug and Frank Heller. Walter J. Bockman was nominated for recorder over Mrs. Ella Peoples, William Hartings, Mrs. Clara Anderson and James Brown, according to unofficial tabulations. 5 Bockman was leading William Hartings by 150 votes with one precinct out.

Robert Zwick defeated Otho Lohmeyer and Dr. J. C. Grandstaff in the race for coroner by about 600 votes. Ralph Roop was renominated for surveyor over Harley Ehrmann by about 450 to 500 votes.

The official returns will be carried in tonight's Daily Democrat.
