Travel of the lonely lane where the bandit had left him unshod, that he had parked near Fairmont Park for a moment to talk before taking Miss Cutler home.

The kidnap, he said, crept silently to the car, thrust a flashlight and a pistol in his face and commanded, "stick 'em up!"

The man made no effort to search for money, but forced the youth to drive about two miles from the highway along the unfrequented road. Then, he said, he forced him to take off his shoes and coat, gave him a push out of the car and sped off toward Los Angeles.

Police cars today scurried along lonely roads and searched every park and isolated spot accessible to an automobile in the vicinity without result. Los Angeles officers watched roads leading to that vicinity, but with the passing of time it became apparent the man and his prisoner had escaped.

The widespread search led to the discovery of another possible similar crime when a well-dressed woman was found unconscious beside the highway at Puenta, 35 miles from here. Los Angeles deputies who discovered her reported the second woman to be at least 30 years of age, but pending positive identification her description was checked with that of Miss Cutler.

The second woman's case was mysterious. A physician called by deputies reported she apparently was not injured, that there was no evidence of liquor and that her long continued unconsciousness indicated the possibility drugs had been administered.
