

## TWO MISSING FLIERS FOUND

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 into the open sea with the hope of being picked up by a steamer.  
 They drifted for five days without food or water, the men said. A steamer which passed less than a mile away failed to sight them.  
 They came back to shore and lay prostrate on the beach or tried to find their way out of the bush. They were found on June 26, six miles west of Cape Bernier.

Capt. Bertram and Flaussmann started from Port Darwin for Batavia in a seaplane on May 14. They were not heard from again until weeks later, when natives found part of the plane and Capt. Bertram's cigarette case on the shore of the Timor Sea.

Search for the men was concentrated in the locality where these discoveries were made, but they had gone to sea on their makeshift float and had drifted away from the rest of their plane. Police Constable Marshall finally received word that natives had rescued the men, and he hurried to their assistance.

The fliers said a shortage of gasoline forced them to land and beach their machine. Then they started their aimless wanderings.
