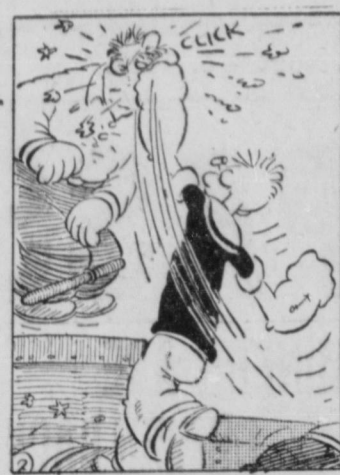

Said sealed proposals will be opened and the contract awarded for said improvement on the 6th day of September, 1932.

Blister Beetles Are Damaging Garden Crops

Lafayette, Ind., Aug. 5—(UP)—Blister Beetles, commonly known as "potato bugs" have grown to adult age in Indiana now and are causing considerable damage to foliage of potatoes, tomatoes and other garden crops, according to reports to the Purdue University entomology department.

The beetle, beneficial in its immature stages, when the larva for the most part feeds on grasshopper

eggs, charges its role at maturity and feeds upon flowers and foliage of most plants.

Sprinkling of infected plants with habrum flosilicate or sodium fluosilicate, either full strength or diluted with lime or talc, is the only effective manner of combating the beetles, the Purdue expert station announced. The insecticides should be applied when the plant is dry.

Former Ku Klux Klan Official Is Sought

Indianapolis August 5—(UP)—Earl Klink, former high official in the Ku Klux Klan with D. C. Stephenson, was sought today as a fugitive after he failed to appear for sentencing on a charge of having attested to a false affidavit. Klink's bond of \$5,000 was ordered forfeited and Judge Thomas Garvin ordered his arrest.

Klink disappeared after being summoned to Criminal court. Police who searched a downtown hotel said they learned he had left a few

hours before.
