Deposits In Indiana Banks Show Decrease

Indianapolis, Aug. 13—(UP)—Deposits in Indiana banks under jurisdiction of the state banking department decreased \$49,720,142.80, during the first six months of 1932, the department announced today.

On December 31, 1931, the report showed, deposits aggregated \$546,273,591.79. On June 30, 1932, the total was \$496,545,488.99.

The number of banks decreased 37, from 561 to 534.
