In his acceptance speech President Hoover announced he was organizing private industrial and financial resources of the country to co-operate effectively with the vast governmental instrumentalities now in motion "so that through their united and coordinated efforts we may move from defense to powerful attack upon the depression along the whole national front."

Governor Eugene Meyer of the federal reserve board has been at work on this.

This program was forecast two weeks ago at the White House. It contemplates:

1. Stimulation of engineering works through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation's \$1,500,000,000 (B) fund for self-liquidating public works.
2. Rebuilding of slum districts into modern housing groups.
3. Expansion of live stock loans.
4. Assistance, financial or otherwise, in developing advance purchases of raw materials such as cotton.
5. General expansion of industrial credits for production in lines

6. Expansion of railroad maintenance and repair work.
7. Expansion of home building under the new Home Loan Bank system.
8. Spreading out of work through voluntary reduction of hours.
9. Miscellaneous cooperation between government agencies and special industries.

HOUSE VOTES DOWN SENATE REFERENDUM

The message said:
"A report has come that the statement was made on the floor of the senate that the Governor would not receive or consider any bills presented to him on Monday, the closing day of the session. This statement is untrue and without foundation in fact."

On Last Stretch
Indianapolis, Aug. 13.—(U.P.)—Last minute action to push through a new revenue measure—probably a sales tax—was started in the Indiana legislature today.

Spurred by the knowledge that a new revenue must be found before close of the general assembly special session Monday night, the legislators planned to reconsider, it was reported, the Hoffman sales tax measure. This proposal was defeated in the senate last week. Its passage and enactment would have to be under suspension of rules.

The new revenue proposal was to be reported in the senate by the special committee appointed to craft plans for new income sources after passage of the \$1.50 tax limitation measure, which takes millions of dollars off the tax duplicates. The committee is composed of Anderson Ketchum, Dem, Greensburg; J. Francis Lechard, Dem., of Milan; Alonzo Lindley, Rep., Kingman, and J. Clyde Hoffman, Rep., Indianapolis.

It was reported that one of the plans considered would place a levy on professional and other untaxed services. Another would apply to chain stores, increasing proportionately according to the number of stores under one ownership. The house defeated the Hoffman "home rule" measure 55 to 37. The bill would have repealed all mandatory salary and levy laws and placed the power of adjusting salaries and levies with county councils.

The senate passed and sent to the house for concurrence the municipal rights league measure that would give cities power to condemn utilities and take them over for operation. A bill seeking the same objective was passed a few days ago by the house and is awaiting the governor's action.

The house pari-mutual bill which would raise revenue from race betting, was sent to final reading in the senate. It was alleged to permit use of the system at county fair races.

Salaries of Dekalb county officers would be reduced by a house measure that passed the senate 32 to 10. The bill now goes to the governor.

The Ryan bill which would put "teeth" in the gasoline tax law was passed by the senate, 42 to 0. The measure, which now goes to the governor, was designed to curb gasoline bootlegging.

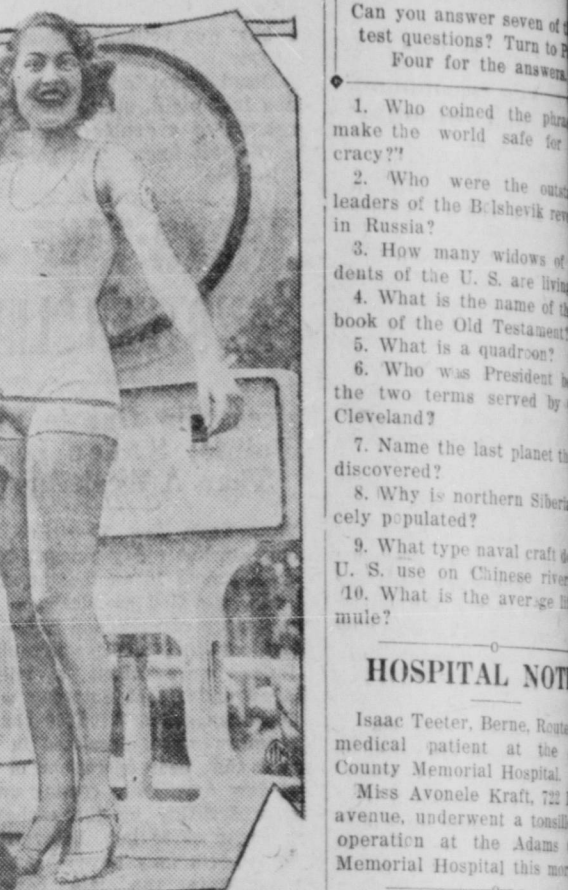
