Notice is hereby given by the undersigned that the Board of Commissioners of Adams County, Indiana, at the office of County Auditor in Decatur, Indiana, will receive sealed proposals for Abraham Beley Macadam Road as set out in the plans and specifications, profiles and requisitions now on file in the office of Auditor.

Said sealed proposals will be opened and the contract awarded for said improvement on the 6th day of September, 1932.

The said improvement is located in Hartford and Wabash townships Adams county, Indiana and more particularly known as Abraham Beley Macadam Road.

The estimated cost of said improvement is \$6,115.08.

Bids will be for the completion of said improvement in accordance with the plans, profile and specifications in the office of the County Auditor, and shall include all labor and material for said work. In no case will extra compensation be allowed for any additional work alleged to have been done by the contractor or contractors to whom is awarded the contract.

Mrs. McCormick's Illness Reconciles Estranged Kin

Famous Family Split for Years By Numerous Disagreements Reunited at Bedside of Dying "Queen of Chicago Society."

Chicago.—No longer existent are the family feuds which for many years disrupted the happiness of the Rockefeller-McCormicks.

When the word first went out over the wires that Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick, confined by illness to her home in Chicago hotel would probably not recover, a note of compassion was struck which had its echo across the entire breadth of the American continent and even on the other side of the Atlantic.

In Switzerland, Mrs. Matilde Oser daughter of the reigning queen of Chicago society, decided that the blood of a Rockefeller was thicker than the water of estrangement and hurried to France, where she boarded a steamer to be at her mother's side.

From Los Angeles came word that the dying woman's former husband, Harold Fowler McCormick, who was divorced from the daughter of John D. Rockefeller, Sr., in 1921, and who later was married to and divorced from Ganna Walska, glamorous opera singer, was en route to Chicago.

Major and Mrs. Eliza Dyer Hubbard of Connecticut, the latter being Mrs. McCormick's daughter, hastened to this city and went directly to the sick room.

At the same time it was indicated that the arrival of Fowler McCormick, the dying woman's son, who last year married FIM Stillman, principal of a sensational divorce case of a decade ago, would be on hand without delay.

Finally, at his New Jersey retreat, John D. Rockefeller, Sr., was described as willing to let bygones be bygones, with mutual forgiveness the watchword. The younger John D. who visited his sister a month ago when her financial troubles became known, made his peace at that time.

These eleven-hour forgivenesses of family differences marked the end of a stormy period of years, with Mrs. McCormick at odds, nearly all the time, with practically her entire family.

She was reckoned for years the richest woman in the world. Always a shrewd business woman, she increased her fortune by wise investments in real estate. Even when she was forced to close up her great stone mansion recently to save expenses, she was still, according to keen financial observers, the world's richest woman.

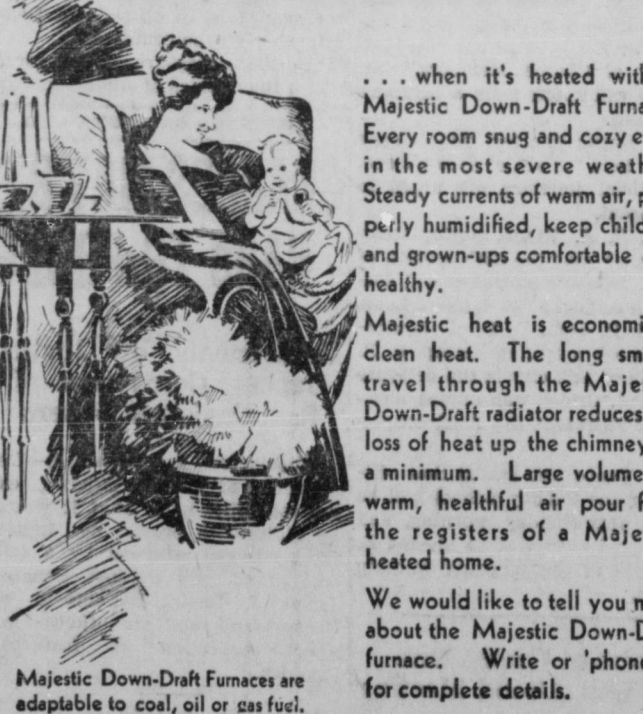
The reason for her long-standing estrangement with her famous father was never made completely clear. Her troubles with her brother were never as serious as her other estrangements, but were intermittent. Her disagreements with her

three children were all the result of what she considered ill-considered and injudicious marriages.

Ironically, the three children joined with John D., Sr., and John D. Jr., approximately a decade ago in a successful fight to prevent Mrs. McCormick, then lately recently divorced from the harvest magnate, from contracting a marriage which they considered "injudicious."

The protests of Mrs. McCormick's family followed her romance with Edwin Krenn, fifteen years her junior. The romance was the outgrowth of a friendship which had begun ten years earlier in Zurich, Switzerland, when Mrs. McCormick
