## OBSTACLES MAY HALT WALKER FROM RUNNING

many Democratic leaders, including Alfred E. Smith.

John H. McCooey, the shrewd, round boss of Brooklyn Democrats, is allied with Tammany but is not Tammany. McCooey was not among those who favored elevation of Curry to Tammany leadership, although he has been active in support since then.

Edward J. Flynn, boss of Bronx Democrats, is an ardent Roosevelt ally. He is sponsor of Joseph V. McKee, successor of Walker and often considered both by Democrats and fusionists as a candidate for the office.

McCooey also is a national committee man, and somewhat interested, therefore, in federal patronage, and in a united party in the state.

Flynn and most of his force will stand by Roosevelt, in any attempt to "knife" the head of the ticket. Curry will stand by Walker with the Manhattan organization Democrats. The balance of power will rest with McCooey who is much closer to Alfred E. Smith than is Curry. His switch to Flynn would make Flynn a Roosevelt man, boss of New York city.

Defeat of Curry and Walker would satisfy many New York city Democratic ambitions, and because it would do so, Tammany hall and allied organizations may induce Walker to postpone his vindication effort.

Walker's health has been poor

for years. A year's rest might restore his health; it also might trench Mayor McKee so firmly he could not be shoved aside in the regularly scheduled 1933 mayoralty election.

Tammany hall believes Walker may legal run for mayor this November. Many Republicans among the legal fraternity believe likewise. There are strong arguments that he may not legally run for the office he resigned until a year later. The test probably will go to the state's highest courts within a few weeks for a decision.

As for a definite statement on Walker's candidacy, none was

made.

The Hutchinsons are flying a leisurely route to Europe. In the plane were Mrs. Hutchinson, the two Hutchinson children, a navigator, a photographer, a radio operator and a mechanic.

The Hutchinsons flew here from Labrador and planned to continue immediately to Angmagssalik, Greenland. From there they will fly to London. Their ocean flight to Greenland was without incident, they said.
