BONUS QUESTION IS MAIN TOPIC

CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE

Sam Reynolds and his Nebraska state delegation planned to fight the newly-hatched resolution every step of the way, claiming that immediate bonus payments would drain the national treasury and imperil the credit of the nation.

A subcommittee headed by Sam Jones of Louisiana was appointed to draft a bonus resolution.

The committee considered 42 proposals and produced the following resolution, which was sent to the delegative committee and will be considered Wednesday:

"Be it resolved: That the American Legion endorses and urges the full payment of adjusted service certificates and that the national officers be instructed to proceed before congress toward enactment of this legislation."

The margin of passage was slim. Five committeemen voted yes. Four voted no.

The minority held out as long as possible for a resolution asking congress to authorize payment when the national treasury has money available.

Harry W. Colmery of Kansas was re-elected chairman of the legislative committee, which will consider the resolution and is expected to recommend it for passage by the convention.

Jones asserted that his committee's recommendation would carry considerable weight with Colmery's group, but was not pleased that the vote had been so close.

Presidential candidates other than President Hoover, who already had announced his views, were polled in telegrams sent last night by Francis McDermott, commander of the Omaha Post, for an expression on the bonus question. The candidates polled were Franklin D. Roosevelt, Norman Thomas, Verne L. Reynolds, and Jacob S. Coxey.

Hurley smiled and paused a moment when a chorus of hoots greeted him as he started to address the convention yesterday. He urged the Legionnaires to abandon partisan politics and drew a round of applause and cheers when he concluded with the words:

"Those men who met the enemy of our nation on the battle fields were neither Democrats nor Republicans; they were greater than either. They were Americans. What we need, my comrades, today are Americans who are big enough to put patriotism above politics."

Women, Weary of Civilization

Sigh for Life in Wilderness

Cities More Savage Than Jungle, Avers Explorer's Secretary. Titled British Women to "Rough It" in Bandit-Ridden Persia.

After having traveled over 80,000 miles through jungles and civilization as the secretary of F. M. Mitchell-Hedges, internationally famous explorer, Miss Jane Harvey Houlson, slim young English girl, is emphatic in admitting that she prefers life in the wilderness to that of our great cities. Miss Houlson, who has spent months in the jungles of Central America without seeing another woman, scoffs at the popular conception of the jungle as a place of savagery and death. She points out that a country where 20,000 people commit suicide and 54,000 more are mowed down by automobiles in a year hasn't much room to talk about savagery. She furthermore draws attention to the fact that a native of the jungle is honest in his criminal activities. If he's going to kill you he'll come right at you from the front and will not employ the dark alley methods of the city gunman. Miss Houlson is returning to the jungle when Mitchell-Hedges lecture tour of the United States is completed. Strangely enough, two prominent fellow-countrywomen of Miss Houlson have similar ideas about the relative merits of the wilds and civilization that she has. They are Lady Louis Mountbatten, cousin of King George of England, and her friend, the Marchioness of Milford Haven, who have professed themselves tired of palaces and drawing-rooms and are planning to start on an expedition through the bandit-ridden interior of Persia early next month. They will travel alone on a course that will take them from the Caspian Sea to the Gulf of Oman.
