Prison Explosion Claims Third Life

Greencastle, Ind., Sept. 30.—(UP)—The death toll in the furnace explosion at the state prison farm last Saturday was increased to three late yesterday with the death of Shelby Herbert, 34, Indianapolis, a convict. He died at the Putnam county hospital here of burns.

Lee Orr and David Scrogins, both guards, also were injured fatally. Ben Martin, 32, Fort Wayne, a prisoner, is in serious condition as the result of injuries.

Law Not Effective Until Next Year

Indianapolis, Sept. 30.—(UP)—The new Indiana law making appointment of county school attendance officers optional will not be effective until next year, Attorney General James M. Ogden has ruled.

In an opinion given to Miss Blanche Merry, state school attendance officer, Ogden set out that the law, passed by the special session of the legislature, contained no emergency clause and present officers took their positions August 1.

"There was no law in effect on the first of August that made appointment of attendance officers optional," the opinion read. Hence, it set out, the new law will not be effective until 1933.

North Mexico Has Heavy Flood Loss

El Paso, Tex., Sept. 30.—(UP)—The most disastrous flood in the history of North Mexico was reported to have swept away several small villages and damages estimated in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

At least seven lives were reported lost.

MAYOR CERMAK BOUGHT STOCK AT LOW PRICE

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National Committeeman Michael Ikeo, David E. Shanahan, speaker of the Illinois house of representatives, William Lorimer, former U. S. senator, and Stuyvesant Peabody, coal magnate.

The syndicate purchased 115,000 shares of Insull Utility Investments, Inc., at a price of \$50 a share. The market price at the time was \$59.25. Each paid in 5 per cent of the purchase price and there was a later 15 per cent assessment.

The syndicate was closed last February with sale of the stock at \$40 a share. All who participated took a 20 per cent loss. Many, however, did not pay the second assessment and creditors of the bankrupt corporation said they would seek collection to add the money to the nearly vanished assets of the corporation.

Among those listed as members of the syndicate was Oscar Hewitt, for 14 years a political and economic writer for the Chicago Tribune. The Tribune, immediately after announcement of the list, announced the release of Hewitt "with deep regret."

"No one on this newspaper was aware of the fact that he was one of the subscribers to the syndicate," the Tribune said. "He had subscribed without thought of the implication that in doing so he was accepting a favor from the Insulls."

Attorneys also started action to recover \$15,000,000 of the corporation's assets on the charge Insull violated terms of a debenture agreement in pledging securities of this amount for loans with Chicago and New York banks.

State's Attorney John A. Swanson announced discovery of a dummy brokerage account operated by Martin Insull, brother of Samuel and one of the leaders in the fallen utilities empire. Evidence indicated, Swanson said, that the account was used from private dealings but that collaterals of certain Insull concerns was used as margin.
