Stock Values Decline
82% From 1929 Highs

New York —(UP)—The market
value of all stocks listed on the
New York Stock Exchange declined
82 per cent from the record high of
\$89,668,276,854 on Sept. 1, 1929, to
a low of \$15,633,479,577 on July 1,
last, indicating the deflation of the
past three years.

Since July, the total valuation
nearly doubled to the end of the
summer and subsequently fell off.
The following table* shows the
valuation of all stocks on the Stock
Exchange as of the start of every
month for the past two years:
