SUBCOMMITTEE APPROVES BILL ASKING REPEAL

CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE
composed of Senators Blaine, Borah, Wis.; Herbert, Repn., R. I.; Borah, Repn., Idaho; Dill, Dem., Wash., and Walsh, Dem., Mont.

The text of the repeal proposal, which now goes to the full judiciary

committee, was as follows:
"Resolved, by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America, in congress assembled (two-thirds of each house concurring therein), that the following amendment is hereby proposed to the constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the constitution when ratified by the legisla-

tures of three-fourths of the several states:
"The eighteenth article of amendment of the constitution of the United States is hereby amended to read as follows:
"Section 1. The eighteenth amendment to the constitution is hereby repealed.
"Section 2. The transportation or importation into any state, territory or possession of the United

States for delivery or use thereof of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.
"Section 3. Congress shall have concurrent power to regulate or prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors to be drunk on the premises where sold."
The subcommittee was unanimous in approving submission of the repeal resolution to the full committee but there were reservations by Blaine and Senator Borah, Repn., Idaho, as to their final action on the resolution.

Borah reserved the right to oppose all or any part of the repeal. Blaine said he would move either in the full committee or on the senate floor to eliminate the section prohibiting the saloon.
