CONFERENCE OPENS SEASON

Chicago Jan. 9—(UP)—Although the edge has been taken off the contest by Northwestern's unexpected defeat Saturday night, the Wildcats meet Purdue here tonight in what is expected to be a hard test for the Boilermakers basketball team.

Nine games make up the Big Ten program this week four tonight and five Saturday night. Purdue, ranking favorite must halt Joe Reiff, Northwestern Captain. Illinois stopped Reiff Saturday and it is a Big Ten axiom that if Reiff can be halted Northwestern can be beaten. Saturday Purdue meets Iowa at Lafayette. The Hawkeyes were victims of an upset at the hands of Michigan last week, and will be without Blackmr and Break, two stars who are out of the lineup pending further investigation of their eligibility.

Tonight's program: Purdue at Northwestern; Iowa at Wisconsin; Chicago at Indiana; Michigan at Illinois.

Saturday schedule: Northwestern at Chicago; Wisconsin at Indiana; Iowa at Purdue; Illinois at Michigan; Minnesota at Ohio State.

The Illinois-Michigan double this week will settle the hopes of these teams which made spectacular showings in opening games. The Illini spurred in the late stages of the game to beat Northwestern by two points. Michigan defeated Iowa, which was lost without Blackmr and Break.

Purdue Wins
Purdue showed old time scoring power by beating Minnesota, 42 to 22. Despite Thummetter's illness coach Lambert found a smart combination. Shatter took his place at guard, and Cotton, sophomore from Terre Haute, proved a deadly shot with eight field goals and two free throws.

Wisconsin with an all-sophomore lineup, had little trouble beating Chicago 26 to 17. Ohio State won as expected over Indiana, 35 to 28.

RIOTS CLAIM EIGHT LIVES

Scores Injured During Rioting in Barcelona, Spain, Sunday

Barcelona, Spain, Jan. 9—(UP)—Police clamped rigid restraint on Barcelona today after rioting, described by authorities as an abortive revolutionary plot, left eight dead and scores injured.

Authorities had been warned and numerous raids recently netted more than 1,000 bombs and considerable quantities of dynamite.

Police patrols were strengthened yesterday when the coup was thought near. Police were sent to the headquarters of the syndicalist union, where a secret meeting was in progress.

Two men were arrested as they arrived in an automobile and charged with possessing bombs. In the ensuing fight, one policeman and a woman bystander were killed, and

a girl was wounded. Another man and five civilians were killed in other fights.

Two bombs were hurled at a central police headquarters from an automobile. One policeman was blown off, and two chauffeurs were injured. Police said the rioters planned to set outbreaks in scattered sections of the city, speed through the streets throwing bombs, and assault police barracks during the night.

Gottschalk Is Named

Senator Thurman A. Gottschalk of Berne has been named to one of the important committees of the state senate. The appointments were made today by Lieut. Governor M. Clifford Townsend.

Committees to which Senator Gottschalk was appointed are, trust companies and savings associations; finance; public health; soldiers' and sailors' ailments; swamp lands and federal relations. Senator Gottschalk is chairman of the committees.
