To Send Delegate

Indianapolis, Jan. 13—(UP)—An Indiana delegate will be sent to the interstate legislative conference at Washington Feb. 3. Gov. Paul V. McNutt announced today.

Instead of one legislator being sent from each house along with a governor's representative, as was requested in the invitation to Indiana, only one man will go. He will be named later.

The conference will concern overlapping of state and federal powers of taxation as well as regulatory legislation.

McNutt said that he and President-elect Roosevelt discussed the conference at the latter's Warm Springs Ga., home several weeks ago.

List County Mileage

Indianapolis, Jan. 13—(UP)—Mileage of county roads by counties through the state, as tabulated by the state highway department have been announced by William J. Titus, chief engineer of the highway department.

The survey showing 68,822 miles of county roads, was made following the special session legislature's action last summer in transferring

all township roads to counties. Computation of county road mileage was necessary as a basis on which gasoline tax is shared.

Counties and their mileage include Adams, 742 miles; Blackford 334 Jay, 749; Wells 757.

Employees of the highway department drove over county roads in every county, or with bicycles impassable by cars, with calibrated speedometers, measuring the roads.

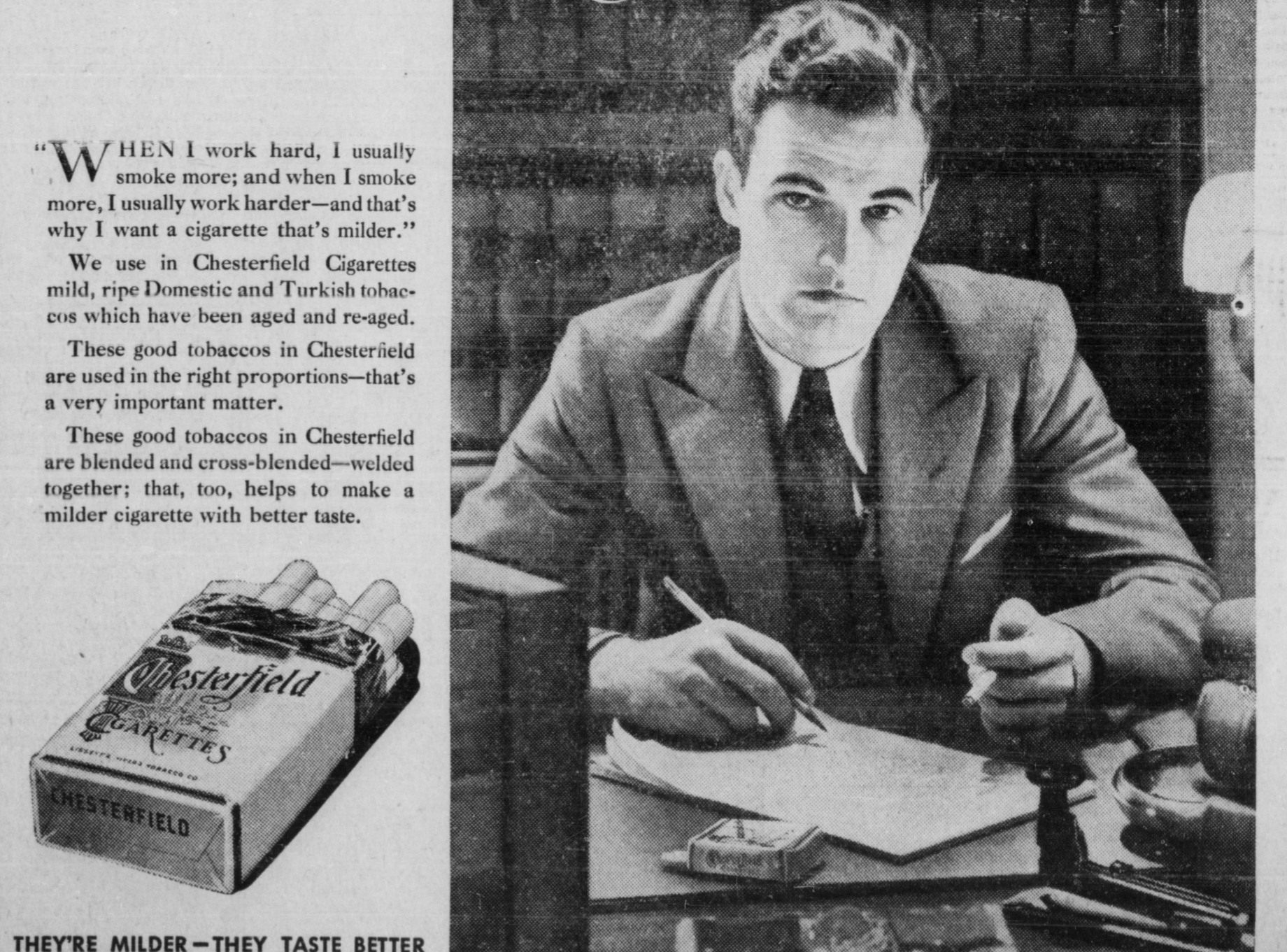
