Resizing A Rug

Place the rug face down on the floor and stretch it very tightly and evenly. Tack it down at frequent intervals. Soak and dissolve 1 1/2 lb. of flake glue in 1/2 gallon of water. In a double boiler or a container surrounded by water. Sprinkle this solution generously over the rug all over rug to dry for at least 24 hours. If rug is light weight do not use enough glue to penetrate to other side.

Laundering Bedspreads

When drying a crinkled bedspread, fold it double lengthwise and pin the edges to the clothesline. This prevents any creases as well as uneven stretching.


