Tulips Need Good Drainage

Poor drainage is the cause of mice. The fumes of naphthalene are most tulip failures. Great care, adequate insurance against all damage by rodents. You can buy it in any seed or drug store; it has nothing to do with soap.

Where geometrical or formal arrangement is not wanted, tulips may be planted with a dibber or a trowel. The first, especially, may be used to make a proper hole in which to drop the bulb when you are planting in groups or in the border. In an established border, however, the dibber is not so good, as there is danger of the bulb not reaching the bottom of the hole, leaving an air space between it and the bottom, in which case it will usually rot. Oftentimes this can be avoided by dropping a little fine dirt down into the hole before setting the bulb, thereby minimizing the risk of the bulb being

an advantage in using the Dutch procedure is that the bed may be disinfected with naphthalene flakes after two inches of soil has been spread over the bulbs, thereby assuring yourself against the probability of the bulb being

Although these precautions might seem somewhat trivial, they should be taken into consideration if you would have successful tulip blossoms next spring; and if you are interested in raising an outstanding crop of this flower you may take in the proper plant food at the rate of four pounds for every 100 square feet planted.
