Tulips Need Good Drainage

Poor drainage is the cause of most tulip failures. Great care should be taken in selecting a bed for this lovely spring flower, and if there is any possibility of too much water being present during the early months, the bed should be elevated to protect the bulbs.

Two methods may be used in planting. Under the Dutch method the bed is dug out six inches deep, the bulbs are set on the bottom in the position desired, and then covered over with soil. When planning a formal bed of tulips where a design is to be worked out this method will serve best.

An advantage in using the Dutch procedure is that the bed may be disinfected with naphthalene flakes after two inches of soil has been spread over the bulbs, thereby assuring yourself against the probability of the bulb being

attacked by the fungus of naphthalene are adequate insurance against all damage by rodents. You can buy it in any seed or drug store; it has nothing to do with soap.

Whether geometrical or formal arrangement is not wanted, tulips may be planted with a dibber or a trowel. The first, especially, may be used to make a proper hole in which to drop the bulb when you are planting in groups or in the border. In an established border, however, the dibber is not so good, as there is danger of the bulb not reaching the bottom of the hole, leaving an air space between it and the bottom, in which case it will usually rot. Oftentimes this can be avoided by dropping a little fine dirt down into the hole before setting the bulb, thereby minimizing
