## Excise Department Takes In Over Million

Indianapolis, Oct. 4. — (U.P.) — The state excise department collected \$1,478,602.11 during the first six months of its existence, according to Samuel H. Lesh, department auditor.

Of this revenue, \$500,574.87 already has been distributed to counties, cities and towns. This month \$50,362 more was available for the same purpose.

A total of \$764,760.04 has been collected toward the \$800,000 which will be ready for distribution to school corporations Nov. 1.
