of our land, and a true and abiding faith in the divine guidance of God."

The President recalled that just seven months ago to the day he took the oath of office at Washington.

"I believed then, and I know now that our people would support definite action that sought the goal of giving every man his due," he said.

Cheering which greeted Mr. Roosevelt's arrival in the ball

room of the Waldorf-Astoria hotel was redoubled when he paused on his way to the platform to chat with former Governor Alfred E. Smith.

Mr. Roosevelt warned his listeners that the federal government, while aiding materially in welfare relief, does not intend to assume the entire job.

"Many times," he said, "I have insisted that every community and every state must first do their share."
