SYNOPSIS

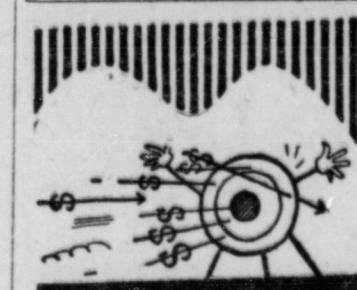
