Three Men Killed In Mine Cave-In

McKeesport, Pa., Oct. 24—(U.P.)—Three men were killed and several others injured today in a cave-in at the McKeesport Coal and Coke Company's Hubbard mine, near here.

The dead were John Uster, 33, McKeesport; John Wilklek, 44, and Joseph Hsegligo, 48, both of Versailles.

The accident occurred, it was understood, as the shifts were changing.

Two mine cars were reported trapped by a rock slide, but all the victims were freed. None was believed imprisoned in the mine.

Three of the injured were brought to McKeesport hospital.

Agent For Breweries Found Shot To Death

Calumet City, Ill., Oct. 24—(U.P.)—An assassin who shot John Plyn, 38, agent for two breweries, to death as he left his home late last night, was sought today by police.

Plyn had left his home by a side entrance when an assassin crept upon him from the rear and fired a shot into the back of his head. As Plyn lay on the ground, the killer fired four shots into his body.

Plyn's wife heard the shots and found him dead. She did not see his slayer. Police said Plyn had been engaged in beer activities several years and was considered influential in Calumet City politics.
