

INJUNCTION IS DENIED ROSEN

Unlicensed Gary Beer Dealer Denied Injunction By Court

Gary, Ind., Nov. 2.—(U.P.)—Abe Rosen, unlicensed Gary beer dealer, seeking to have the state beer control law declared unconstitutional, was denied an injunction against Indiana law enforcement officers by a three-judge federal court yesterday.

The federal judges refused to consider his injunction petition pending final action on the case by state courts.

Rosen has an appeal pending before the state supreme court challenging the constitutionality of the law.

He had asked the federal court to restrain Neil Fry, Porter county sheriff, from interfering with beer sales. Rosen is operating under a state county superior court order against local authorities and Paul Fry, state excise director.

If the supreme court finds the law unconstitutional, the case will be appealed to federal courts. Oscar B. Thiel, attorney for Rosen, announced.

The Indiana members of the federal court, Judges Will M. Sparks of the District Court of Appeals, and Robert C. Baltzell of the Southern Indiana district, joined in denying Rosen a hearing.

Judge Walter C. Lindley, Danville, Ill., dissented with an opinion that the federal court should enjoin the state's motion to deny the case and should immediately consider constitutionality of the law.

Pleas of six other lifers convicted on murder charges were denied. They were:

Charles Coats, sentenced in Vanderburgh county in 1927 for the slaying of a woman.

John Bond, Gibson county, 1917, fatal stabbing of Fred Zimmerman during an argument over watering of mules at a livery stable where both were employed.

Nick Dundovich, Lake county, 1920, fatally shooting a man during a fight at a wedding. He originally was sentenced to death but was granted a commutation to life in 1921.

George Gilman, Vigo county, 1915, slaying his wife.

Charles Hanson, Marshall county, 1922, shooting and robbing a taxi driver.

John Bauer, Marshall county, 1922, convicted with Hanson.

Notes held and listed as other assets and not included in the resources total \$50,868.92. It was stated these notes were held out at the time the bank reorganized and opened for business, many of them being listed as doubtful as to payment at that time.

aged, or old, the same irresistible force is ever urging them onward and upward only to find, that when they have reached the crest, they are looking down into the valley of the shadows of death. And beyond the shadows what? That is the question that arises in every human soul and finds its answer only in each individual life.

"Death, my dear friends, is one experience that is common to us all. It is the one place where all men meet on equal terms. And yet the commonest fact of our existence is not death but life. Even now as we see the first breath of winter blast the greenness and the beauty of the earth it is also whispering to every tree and shrub, every plant and blade of grass, the promise of resurrection, of a rising in another spring, to a newer and a fresher beauty. 'For unless the grain of wheat fall into the earth and be corrupted,' says the Lord, 'itself remaineth alone.' Surely He who sends the warm rains and the gentle breezes to awaken the slumbering seed will not leave the soul of man to perish forever? The human soul with infinite yearnings, unfulfilled hopes, unsatisfied desires, surely He will not let it die incomplete and imperfect? The answer to these questions rings out clearly from Holy Scripture, 'I know that my Redeemer liveth and that in my flesh I shall see my God.' 'I am the Resurrection and the life, he that believeth in Me though he be dead shall live.'"

"To have too great a fear of death is not Christian but pagan. In the days when faith was strong and Christianity at its best, death was hailed as a passing to a newer and fuller life. No funeral dirges were sung in the catacombs, but hymns of hope, thanksgiving and intercession. And if we live the life of a true Christian, our hymns will be of a like nature. If we act now as we will then wish to have acted, we will hear the good angel Death, say, 'Have you not born the heat and the burden of a long and wearisome way? Have you not groaned and sweated under the weight of labor? Have you not spent your days and your nights weaving beautiful tapestries of virtue on the loom of sorrow and with the white hands of pain? Behold now your exceeding great reward. Since you, in your mortal life have stood with Christ on the Mount of the Crucifixion, so shall you now stand beside Him on the Mount of Transfiguration forever.'"

"Yes, we too will then be ready to sing hymns of hope, thanksgiving and intercession for we will then look upon death not as a failure, an evil, or a tragedy, but as the opening of a door to an antechamber that leads into the halls of life, and light and love everlasting. But if the end of a good Christian is so blessed, why then these monuments of our beloved do we stand here today amidst dead and pray for them? Simply because that while we may know that they have died in the friendship of God we also know nothing however slightly defiled can enter into the presence of the all holy God. We therefore say today, 'Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord and let the perpetual light shine upon them. May their souls through the mercy of God rest in peace.'"

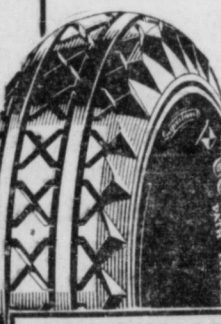
