Government Resumes Gold Price Boosting

Washington, Nov. 28—(UP)—The Government resumed its gold price boosting program today after a lapse of a week, in an effort to buoy up commodity prices and halt the rapid appreciation of the

dollar in foreign exchange markets.

After holding its gold buying rate at \$33.76 an ounce since last Tuesday in an effort to allow the government bond market to regain stability, the price was boosted nine cents to \$33.85 an ounce.
