DECATUR G. E. BEATS ROANOKE IN FIRST GAME

Local Independent Team Wins First Home Game Of Season Monday

The Decatur G. E. Club opened its home season with a 31-24 victory over the Roanoke Independents Monday night at the public high school gymnasium. It marked the second victory in three starts for the local independent team.

The game was close and hard fought all the way, few points separating the two quintets at any stage of the contest.

Roanoke led at the end of the first quarter, 11 to 9, and at the half, 16 to 14.

Decatur rallied in the second half holding a two-point margin, 29 to 18, at the third quarter, and gradually pulled away from the visitors in the fourth and final period.

DeBolt, Decatur floor guard was the leading scorer for both teams with four field goals and two free throws for a total of 10 points. Steele was next high for the G. E. Club with three field goals and one foul toss.

Welsh led Roanoke with three field goals and a brace of charity points. McClure registered three times from the field, and Reed hit twice from the field and twice the

charity stripe.

In the preliminary game, the G. E. seconds were defeated by the Monmouth Rockets.

The G. E. Club will play at Huntington Wednesday night and will meet the North Side recreation team at Fort Wayne Sunday afternoon.

or telephone. The reason for this request is to save applicants for work the trouble of coming to the office, and to give the officers the necessary time to take care of their many duties relative to the making up of payrolls, and keeping the government records straight.

"Mr. Dugan has notified the local CWA office that the First State Bank will make no charge for cashing government checks. Some confusion was experienced when the first pay checks were issued last Saturday. It was reported that some merchants made a collection charge.

"Mr. Linn and Mr. Thompson stated that William H. Book, Civil Works Administrator for the State of Indiana, was most explicit in his instructions to the federal officers in charge of CWA work in the county units, that neither religion nor politics should play any part in this great nation-wide re-employment program, that nothing but urgent human need should be given consideration. They further stated that these ideals would be strictly followed in placing men in employment.

"Some idea may be gained of the difficulties facing the local officers when they must struggle with the task of being able to employ 367 men out of a total of approximately 1000 applications.

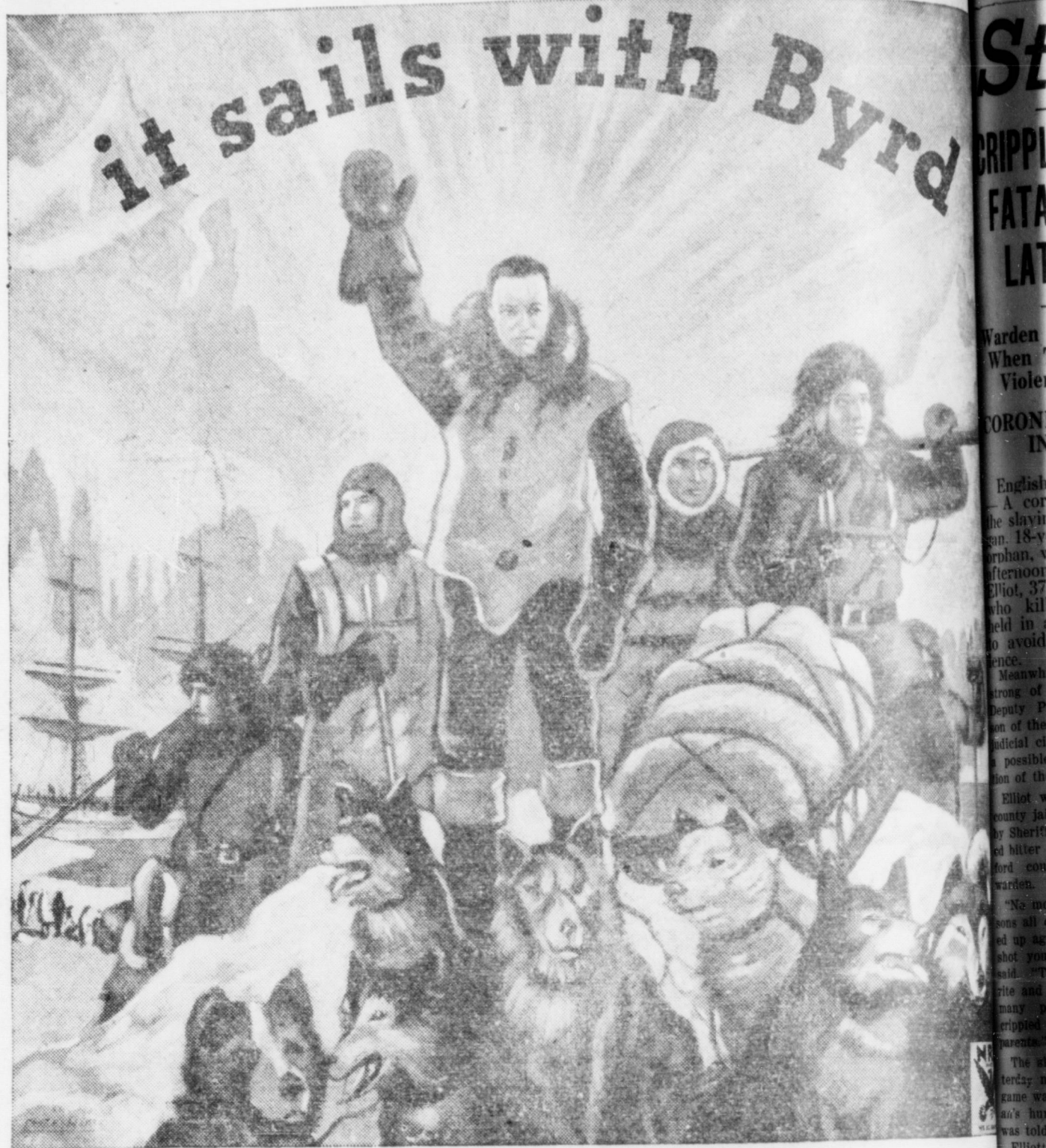
