Chicago Gangster Slain By Gunmen

Chicago, Feb. 5.—(U.P.)—Internal feuds among remnants of the Alphonse (Scarface) Capone gang were blamed today for the shooting to death of Ernest Rossi, 37, public enemy and bank robber and kidnapping suspect.

Rossi was killed by two men who waited under the back stairway to the apartment of "Dago Lawrence" Mangano, Rossi's brother-in-law and a powerful gang leader. Two shotgun charges struck the victim.

Rossi was to have appeared Feb. 21 with a writ of habeas corpus by which he sought to avoid extradition to Holland, Michigan, where he was charged with the robbery of a bank.

JAMES A. REED TO AID STATE

Former Missouri Senator Aids In Fight On Kidnapers

Chicago, Feb. 5.—(U.P.)—James A. Reed, former Missouri senator, today sought to aid the state's attorney's office in its fight to convict Roger Touhy, Chicago gangster, and two companions of death penalty kidnapping charges.

Reed flew here from his home in Kansas City yesterday and immediately departed for Washington. He will seek to prevent the arrest of John (Jake the Barber) Factor by federal authorities.

Factor has been allowed comparative freedom as a state's witness. He identified Touhy, Gustav Schaeffer and Albert Kator as members of a kidnapping gang which held him for ransom last summer.

As a result of a jury disagreement, the three gangsters will be retried beginning Feb. 13.

Federal authorities have been asked by the British government to place Factor under arrest. Reed and State's Attorney Thomas J. Courtney believed this act would harm the state's case.

Reed said his entry into the case was motivated by his hatred of kidnapers. Mrs. Nell Donnelly, Kansas City manufacturer, was held by kidnapers before her marriage to Reed.

Over 3,000 Loans For Home Owners
Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 5.—(U.P.)—More than 3,000 loans aggregating \$7,035,631 have been made to home owners in Indiana by the Home Owners Loan Corporation since last August, it was announced here today.

E. Kirk McKinney, state manager of the corporation, said that during the last week in January over \$1,000,000 in loans were made in the state. About \$2,500,000 in loans were authorized during the entire month.

The loans average \$2,500, he stated. There have been 3,008 loans since the corporation was formed last August.
