FOUR TEAMS IN SEMI-FINALS OF GRADE TOURNEY

St. Joe of Decatur, Three Ft. Wayne Teams To Meet Sunday

St. Joe of Decatur, Precious Blood, St. Patrick defending champion and St. Andrews will play Sunday afternoon in the semi-finals of the second annual Catholic invitational eighth grade tournament being played in the Catholic gym here.

St. Joe (Decatur) and Precious Blood will tangle in the first of the semi-finals Sunday afternoon. St. Andrews and St. Patrick will meet in the second game. From the results of yesterday's games fans will be assured of two good games. It is believed that there will be a record crowd at the final and consolation games Sunday evening.

Nine Fort Wayne Catholic eighth grade teams and the local St. Joe team are competing for the Con J. Sterling trophy, which will be given to the winner of the final game Sunday evening by Mr. Sterling. At the same time the sportsmanship medal, given by Loe Brothers of this city will be awarded. The recipient of this award will be determined by officials, Hockey Mylott and Carl Gerber, and official scorer, Guy Tester.

After the games Friday afternoon the girls of the local St. Joe eighth grade served all the competing teams with a free dinner.

The games started at 1:30 o'clock Friday afternoon and were continued at 8:30 o'clock Friday evening. The semi-finals will start at 2:45 o'clock Sunday afternoon. The final game will be played at 8:30 Sunday evening and will be preceded by a consolation game between the losers in the semi-finals at 7:30 o'clock.

St. Patrick, defending champions, earned the right to play in the semi-finals by the grace of a bye in the first round and the defeat of a tired Cathedral team, 30-18, in Friday night's game. St. Patrick led from the second quarter until the end of the game.

St. Andrews showed the results of their afternoon game when they met St. Mary's, also holders of a bye in the first round. St. Andrews was able to hold the fresh St. Mary's squad to a 9-9 scored tied by the end of the first half. They staged a scoring spree early in the third quarter and at one time held a 22-12 lead which they gradually lost until the siren saved them a two-point victory at 27-25.

St. Andrews supplied all the thrills in the afternoon session with their overtime 22-20 victory over St. Peter. The lead changed from one team to another during the last half until with seconds to go Schoenle, St. Andrews bantam weight forward who had been held scoreless, sank two free throws to tie the score 20-20 at the end of the regular playing period. A field goal won the game for St. Andrews.

Cathedral met with considerable opposition when they beat St. Hyacinth, 24-21. Not until the last minutes of play was the game assured. Precious Blood had little difficulty in crushing St. Joe (Fort Wayne), 51-24. Precious Blood possessed a big rangy squad which used clever plays and passes. They should furnish plenty of opposition to St. Joe (Decatur) in the semi-finals Sunday.

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Locals Win Easily

St. Joe (Decatur) and Teepie, center, set this year's tournament record for scoring, in defeating St. Jude, 60-20. Teepie scored 28 points, all of them field goals.

St. Joe jumped into an early 6-2 lead and had St. Jude 12-5 by the end of the first quarter. The locals overcame all efforts to stop them in the second quarter, leading 28-13, by the end of the third quarter they led 42-16. Teepie's basket in the last 15 seconds enabled Decatur to triple the score, 60-20, over the Fort Wayne team. Decatur failed to make a free throw.

FOUR CATHOLIC TEAMS TO PLAY IN TOURNAMENT

Decatur, Fort Wayne, Anderson And Huntington Will Compete

At the request of officials of the National Catholic tournament, the Decatur Commodores, Central Catholic of Fort Wayne, St. Marys of Anderson and St. Marys of Huntington will compete in a four-team tournament Monday, March 12.

Invitations to the national tourney will be based largely on the results of this tourney. All four of the teams have filed for invitations to the tourney and it is considered likely that at least two of these four teams will be invited to the national.

Officials of the four teams met at Fort Wayne Friday afternoon and decided to hold the tourney at the Concordia College gym in Fort Wayne on the date mentioned above.

Huntington and Anderson will meet in the first game of the tourney at 2:30, with the Commodores and Central Catholic meeting at 3:30.

The losers in the afternoon games will meet at 8 p. m. with the two winners battling at 9 o'clock.

Walter Geller and Jake McClure, South Side coach, were agreed on as officials for the tourney. These two men worked the invitational tournament here last month and gave excellent satisfaction.

Admission prices for the tourney will be 60 cents for both sessions and 35 cents for a single session. Adult and student tickets will be the same price.

eight markets for American products, and it was believed that if given the grant of power, the President would not delay long before putting it into use. There was no indication, however, of what specific agreements, if any, were in consideration.

The possibility of using the proposed trade-agreement power for purposes of political bargaining in the diplomatic field was not raised. The tariff law changes cover commercial agreements only.

The new law will be forged in the face of what is expected to be the bitterest congressional battle since the President took office.

Republican leaders centered opposition on the new delegation of wide power to the chief executive. Sectional groups in congress threatened trouble. They were fearful that tariff rates they have fought to maintain for years would be in danger. Serious controversy loomed against the provision in the bill construed as making the new policy permanent.

General agreement existed that enactment of the bill might remove from the partisan political arena an issue which has been paramount for more than 100 years.

Speaker Rainey said the house ways and means committee "should be able to report the bill out in a few days."

FIVE ARRESTED FOR ROBBERIES

REPUBLICANS ATTACK DEMOS

National Committee Attacks Democratic National Committee

Washington, Mar. 3.—(UP)—What the Democratic national committee didn't say about President Roosevelt's first year in office was seized upon by the Republican national committee today as grounds for a first class political free-for-all.

Reversing the ordinary procedure, Chairman Everett Sanders of the Republican committee attacked Charles Michelson, Democratic publicity director, and the Democratic party, for what they didn't say instead of what they did say.

The strange turn of events resulted when Michelson did not issue a 1,000-word summary of Mr. Roosevelt's first year in office. The statement was prepared and sent to newspapers to be released on the anniversary of the President's inauguration.

Then notice was sent to newspaper offices to kill the statement because the Democratic bureau of publicity was "anxious to avoid the issuance of any statement which can possibly be construed as partisan propaganda, detrimental to a united national effort for recovery."

That action made the Republican committee pretty angry. Sanders indicated.

cratic national committee," said Sanders, "must rank as the outstanding piece of fiction so far this year. The plain truth is the record has been suppressed because the ballyhoo it contained about the success of the 'new deal' would have excited derision among all classes of people."

Sanders claimed the Democrats killed their statement because they suddenly realized that all of the President's recovery agencies had failed.

"The Democratic national committee exercised such self-censorship in its efforts to avoid even the appearance of being partisan," he, "that it limited its expenditure last year to a little less than a million dollars."



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
