should not apply to them.

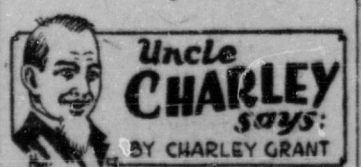
Adams county will have fourteen

that could be applied.

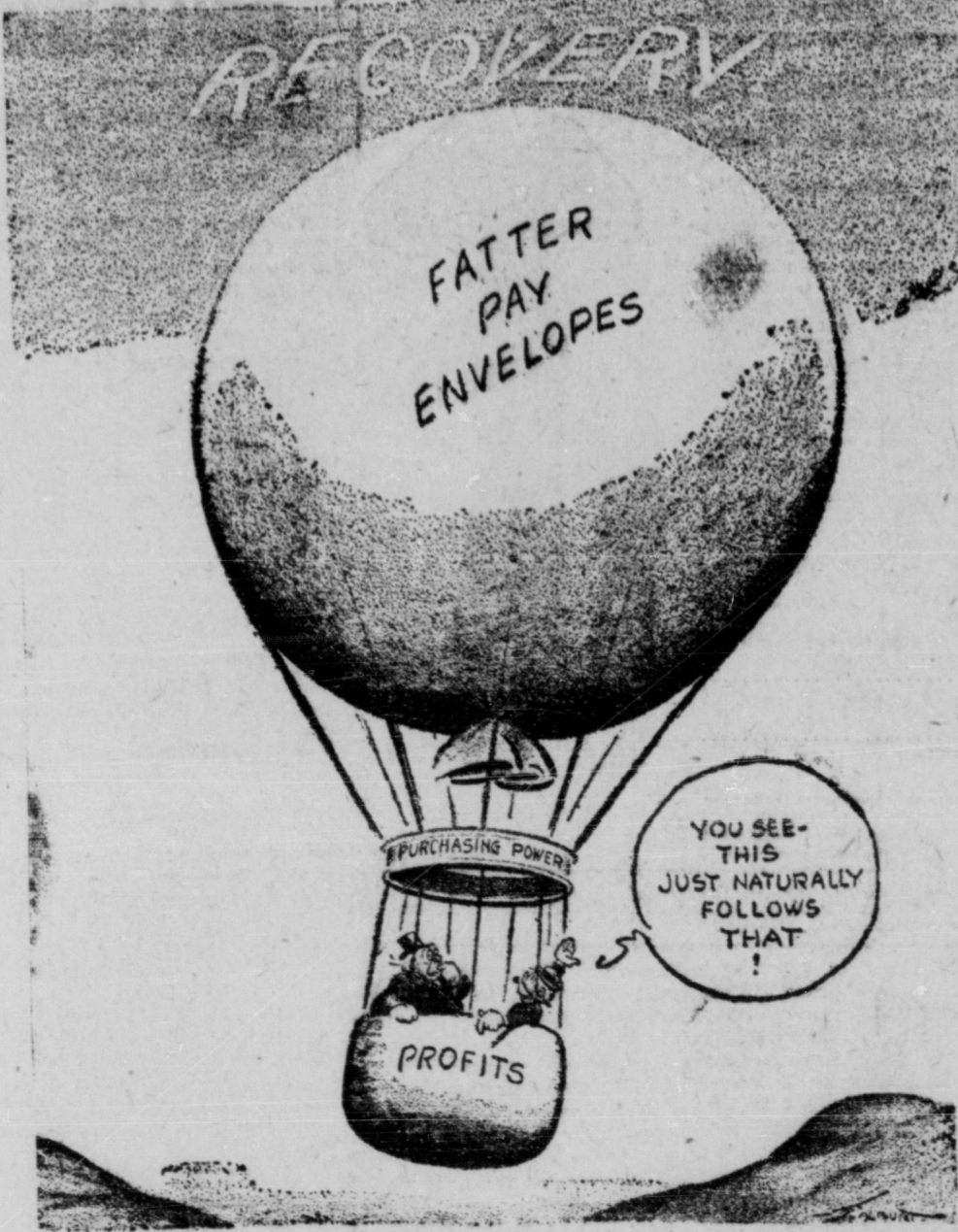
The Catholic basketball tourna-

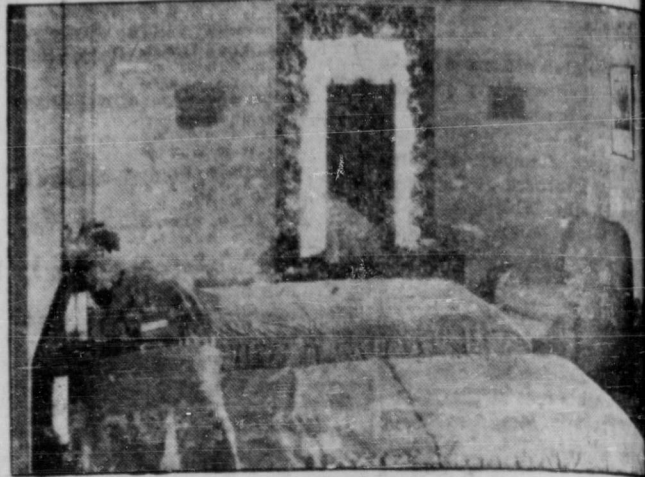
