ANNUAL INDOOR MEET ON TODAY

State High School Track And Field Meet At Butler Fieldhouse

Indianapolis, Mar. 31.—(U.P.)—Athletes from 58 Indiana high schools participated in the annual state indoor track and field and swimming championships at Butler field house here today.

Record performances were expected in at least two events—the 60-yard dash and half-mile. Clifford of Horace Mann (Gary) ran the 60-yard distance in 6.3 seconds, two seconds faster than the state record and only one second above the world's record. In a preliminary at the third annual Notre Dame invitational meet a week ago.

Because Horace Mann has at least four other fast runners, it was the heavy favorite to win the state title.

Truitt of Hammond, who last week ran the half-mile in almost a full second under the state record, was expected to repeat the performance.

The defending champion, Froebel of Gary, which has held the state indoor championship for the last six years, lost all but two of its last year's squad by graduation.

Little was known of the strength of other schools as the meet started, the Notre Dame invitational having been the only regular indoor meet held this season for Indiana schools.

A field of 297 athletes, representing 44 schools, participated in the track and field competition. Finals were to be held this afternoon.

tions by issuing bonds and have outstanding at any one time a total of not more than \$2,000,000,000 of such bonds.

Like United States Government bonds those issued by the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation are exempt, together with the income derived from them from all Federal, State, municipal, and local taxation, except surtaxed, estate, inheritance and gift taxes. They are eligible security for use by member banks of the Federal Reserve system in borrowing on their own 15-day notes from Federal Reserve banks.

The corporation's bonds are lawful investments for all trust, public, and fiduciary funds, the deposit or investment of which is under the authority or control of the Federal Government. The first issue will bear interest at the rate 3 1/4 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually. The bonds of this issue are dated March 15, 1934, mature in 30 years from that date, and are callable upon notice 10 years after the date of issue.

Chicago Gunman Is Killed During Robbery

Chicago, March 31.—(U.P.)—Detective Edward Lynn shot and killed an unidentified gunman today during a robbery in a west side drug store. A woman bystander was critically wounded.

The bandit was about 28 years



old and shabbily dressed. He had lined up the store manager and four other persons against a wall when Lynn and another detective were hastily summoned by a passerby.

At Lynn's command to surrender, the bandit wheeled and fired at the policeman, but missed. Lynn's fire at close range felled the bandit.

One of the policeman's bullets were believed to have pierced the outlaw's hand and struck Miss Nell Shabbaro, 32.

Insull Refuses To Go Ashore

Istanbul, Turkey, Mar. 31.—(U.P.)—Police asked Samuel Insull to go ashore for questioning today. Insull refused bluntly, and police left his chartered steamship Maiotis, to get new instructions

from the government at Ankara. Insull remained under guard. He has been here since Thursday when his little ship cast anchor off the Leander Tower at the entrance to the Bosphorus, which joins the sea of Marmora and the Black Sea to which Insull was going.

Police planned if possible to hand Insull over to American Ambassador Robert P. Skinner, at his request.

An eight-year-old boy confessed that five boys whose ages ranged from eight to 15 years, had robbed three stores and a school building here. He said he robbed a grocery single-handed Thursday night after three of his companions already had been arrested.

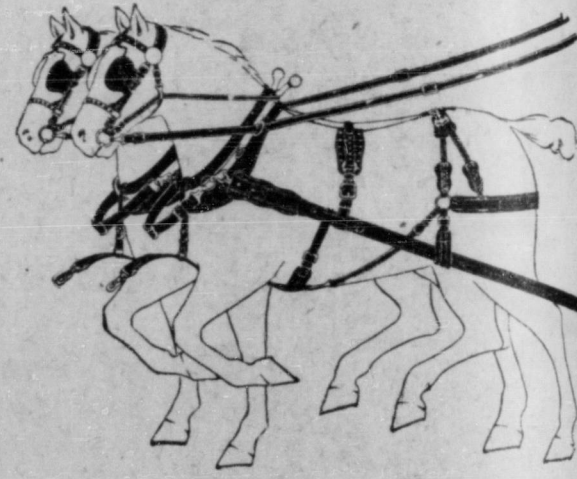
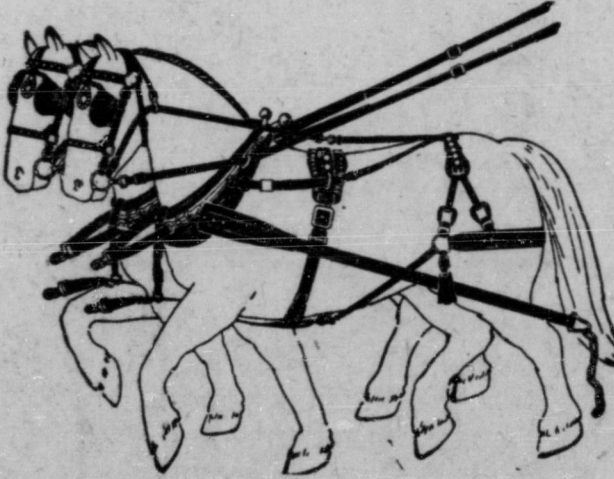
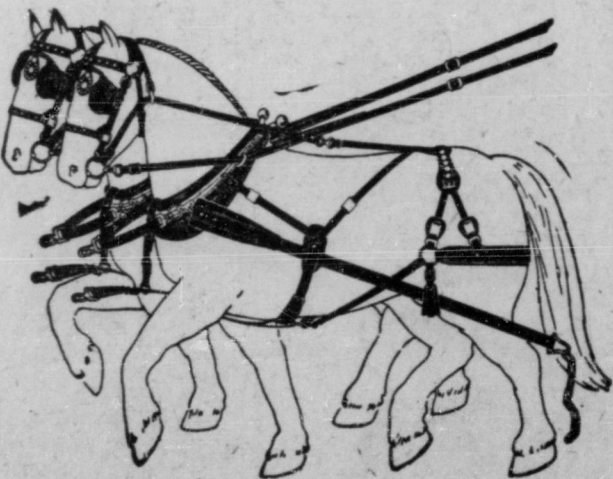
