Suppose he is re-elected, just what good can he do for Indiana during the next six years in Washington? Surely Indiana deserves something better than a clown who makes the state the butt of laughs. The veterans, to whom he will appeal for votes, should ask Robinson what he did all those eight years during which he declares the big interests were endeavoring to deprive veterans of their just rewards. And yet he has the gall to declare there is no partisan politics involved as far as he is concerned. Why, the only earthly reason he ever took up the cause of the veterans was to win their votes.


Isinglass
