George Newbauer, of Hartford  
City has withdrawn from the race  
for the Democratic nomination for  
senator from this district, leaving  
but two candidates in the field, both  
from Adams county. These are  
Senator Thurman A. Gottschalk,  
who has held the position the past  
eight years and John Mosure, former  
auditor of the county. Mr. New-  
bauer states that he did not desire  
to enter into any contest for the  
honor and preferred to retire.

The thinking people of this na-  
tion and this state are still with  
the President in his plan for the

representatives they have sent to  
Washington support that plan and  
for that reason Senator VanNuys  
voted as he did. His statement  
that he had received hundreds of

President, is characteristic of the  
honesty and courage of the only  
Senator Indiana has in Washington  
with those attributes.

Senator Robinson will soon re-  
turn to Indiana seeking re-election  
on the basis of the only thing he  
has ever done in the Senate, that  
being opposition to the President's  
economy plan. Suppose he is re-  
elected, just what good can he do  
for Indiana during the next six  
years in Washington? Surely Indi-  
ana deserves something better  
than a clown who makes the  
state the butt of laughs. The vet-  
erans, to whom he will appeal for  
votes, should ask Robinson what  
he did all those eight years during  
which he declares the big inter-  
ests were endeavoring to deprive  
veterans of their just rewards. And  
yet he has the gall to declare there  
is no partisan politics involved as  
far as he is concerned. Why, the  
only earthly reason he ever took  
up the cause of the veterans was  
to win their votes.

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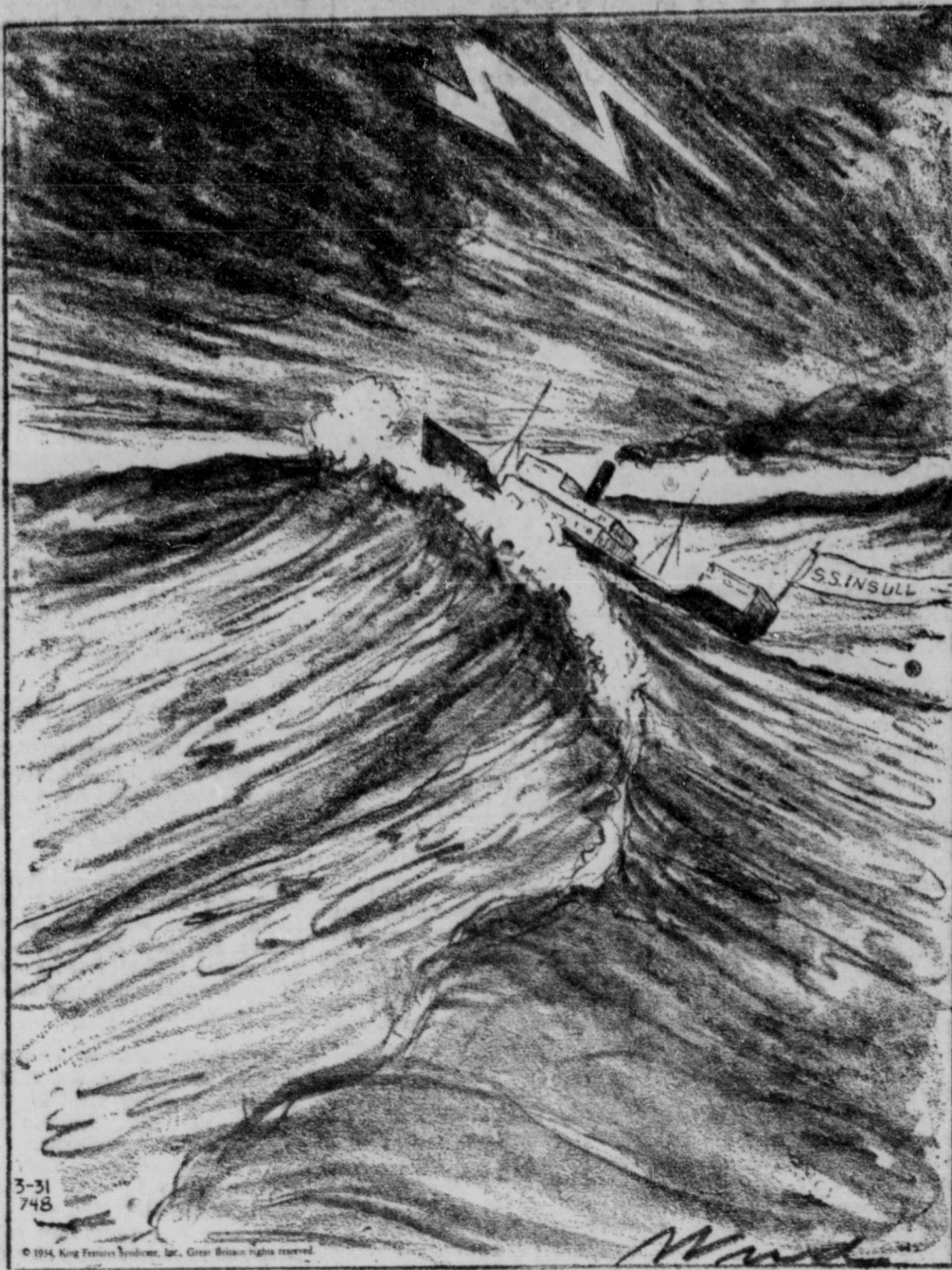
