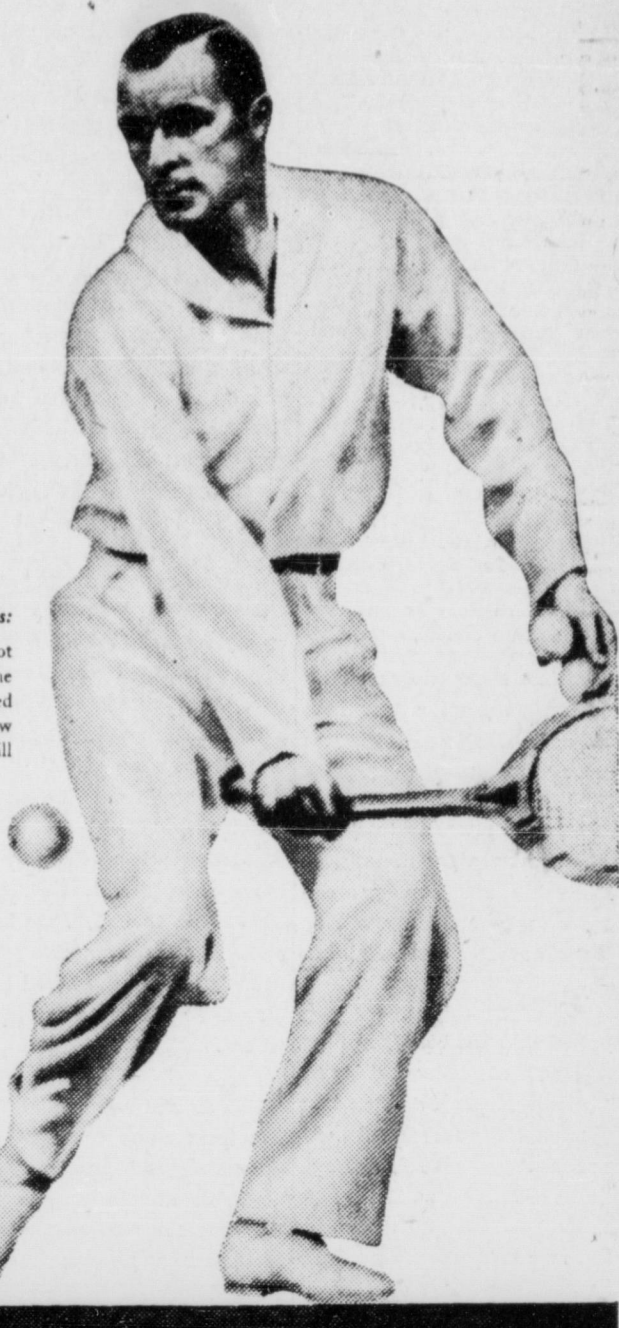

Four Deny Guilt In Callahan Murder

Indianapolis, April 9—(UP)—Four persons held for questioning in connection with the murder of Bert Callahan, 45, wealthy Indianapolis real estate man, were arranged in municipal court today.

All were charged with vagrancy and pleaded not guilty. They were placed on bond of \$3,000 each.

One of the suspects, Mrs. Pauline Free, 26, a waitress, was taken into custody after it was reported that a "woman in white" was seen rapping at the door of Callahan's bachelor apartment shortly before the murder.

The others are Roy Hill, 41, Virgil Hart, 33, and Herman Nelson, 28.

SENATOR REED HITS POLICIES

Republican Senator Makes Attack On Roosevelt Policies

Washington, April 9—(UP)—Senator David A. Reed, R. Pa., launching his re-election campaign, today sounded what was expected to be a keynote for the Republican election campaign with a strong attack on Roosevelt policies as "Futile and Fantastic," "poisonous," and "Dangerous to American civilization."

Special attention was drawn to Senator Reed's attack on the administration by the likelihood that it would furnish a working text for the republican drive to regain in the November election much of the ground lost in the 1932 landslide. First test comes in the Illinois primaries this week.

Reed, a leading conservative republican spokesman, pictured grave dangers in continuation of the policies launched under Mr. Roosevelt which he said threatened to "carry us over the brink of inflation to complete chaos."

The charges of Dr. William A. Wirt, Gary, Indiana, schoolmaster, found an echo in Reed's statement. Wirt charged the "brain trust" with plotting a revolution.

Elwood Bank Cashier Faces Three Charges

Anderson, Ind., Apr. 9—(UP)—Charged with embezzlement, larceny and obtaining money under false pretenses, Luther M. Gross, cashier of the Citizens Bank of Elwood, was under arrest today.

The affidavits were filed by C. F. Whitehead, Madison county prosecutor, who alleged that a discrepancy of \$40 was found in the Callaway estate at Elwood.

Gross was specifically charged with purchasing 20 shares of stock in the Meyer-Klizer Bank at Indianapolis, reporting that he paid \$100 a share. The affidavits charged that he paid only \$1,960 plus accrued interest of \$11.

Mail Carrier Held For Theft Of \$8,000

Connersville, Ind., Apr. 9—(UP)—Charged with theft of more than \$8,000 in bonds and money from a registered mail pouch, Philip L. Bottles, 18, substitute mail carrier, was to be turned over to federal authorities today.

Bottles was arrested here last night and confessed after the loot was found hidden in his room, local authorities reported.

The theft occurred last night when Bottles accompanied the regular mail carrier from the post-office to the Baltimore and Ohio railroad station, it was charged.

Bottles disappeared shortly before the train arrived and was arrested after a railway mail clerk noticed the pouch had been slit open and looted.
