PRESIDENT TO MEET LEADERS

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE) would turn thumbs down on the McLeod bill which would guarantee payment by the government to persons having deposits in closed banks. It was understood he felt that passage would open the door to federal payments to insolvents in other lines.

He also was ready for close study of the silver question, a burning one insofar as western representatives and senators are

concerned. Financial circles are confident that the omnibus bill reported out by the senate agriculture committee Tuesday will not pass.

A measure on which major attention is certain to be centered in the White House discussions is stock market regulation. Mr. Roosevelt is desirous for market legislation at this session.

With this in mind he was expected to review amendments to the original measure which liberalize its salient features.

The new tax bill will be scanned in its entirety by the President.

It was expected that Mr. Roosevelt would stand pat on the legislative program he has presented and which is practically complete. It was not believed he will submit new major recommendations at this session.
