Mr. Thompson lost Adams county by a small margin to his opponent, Von Elchhorn, but carried Wells by nearly 400, giving him a majority of 195. Each of these men have served you well in the past and deserve support in November. They are experienced and capable and will be able to represent their districts in the highest grade manner.

In Indiana the cost of maintaining a prison inmate is about one dollar per day. Under probation the offender remains at home, under the guidance of the probation officer or juvenile court.
