He picked up a couple of friends in Beverly Hills and started for the beach. The sun was shining, the air was balmy, and there was just enough ocean breeze to take the edge off the heat.

Leaning back into the deep cushions of his \$15,000 car the producer sighed with satisfaction.

"Ah!" he exclaimed, "What a lovely day of the week for Sunday to fall on!"

The laugh is on Dorothy Burgess, and I think even she will admit it. Caught up in Hollywood's new urge to get away from crowds and things, Dorothy gave up her apartment and took a house in the Hollywood hills. She got away all right. WINS VERDICT FROM JAIL TERM

William P. McCracken Wins Decision From Senate Conviction

Washington, July 9—(U.P.)—William P. MacCracken, former assistant secretary of commerce, won a victory today against a 10 day jail sentence imposed by the senate, when the district court of appeals held that the senate lacked jurisdiction to inflict such a punishment.

The senate imposed the sentence after MacCracken failed to produce certain documents in connection with the airmail investigation.

The court reversed the decision of the district supreme court dismissing MacCracken's petition for a writ of habeas corpus following his arrest by the senate.

The decision was split, three members of the court holding the senate was without jurisdiction to inflict such punishment on MacCracken while the remaining two members of the court dissented from the majority view.

The next step, should the department of justice so desire, will be a petition to the United States supreme court for a writ of certiorari. If the court grants the writ the case will be heard by the highest court.

The decision threatened to have a pronounced effect on all future attempts of the senate or house to punish witnesses who fail to carry out commands by investigating committees.

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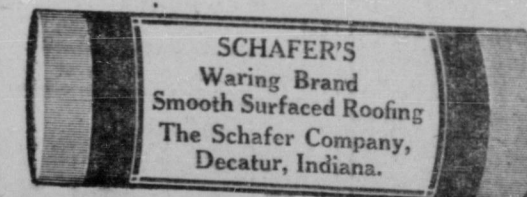
