came.

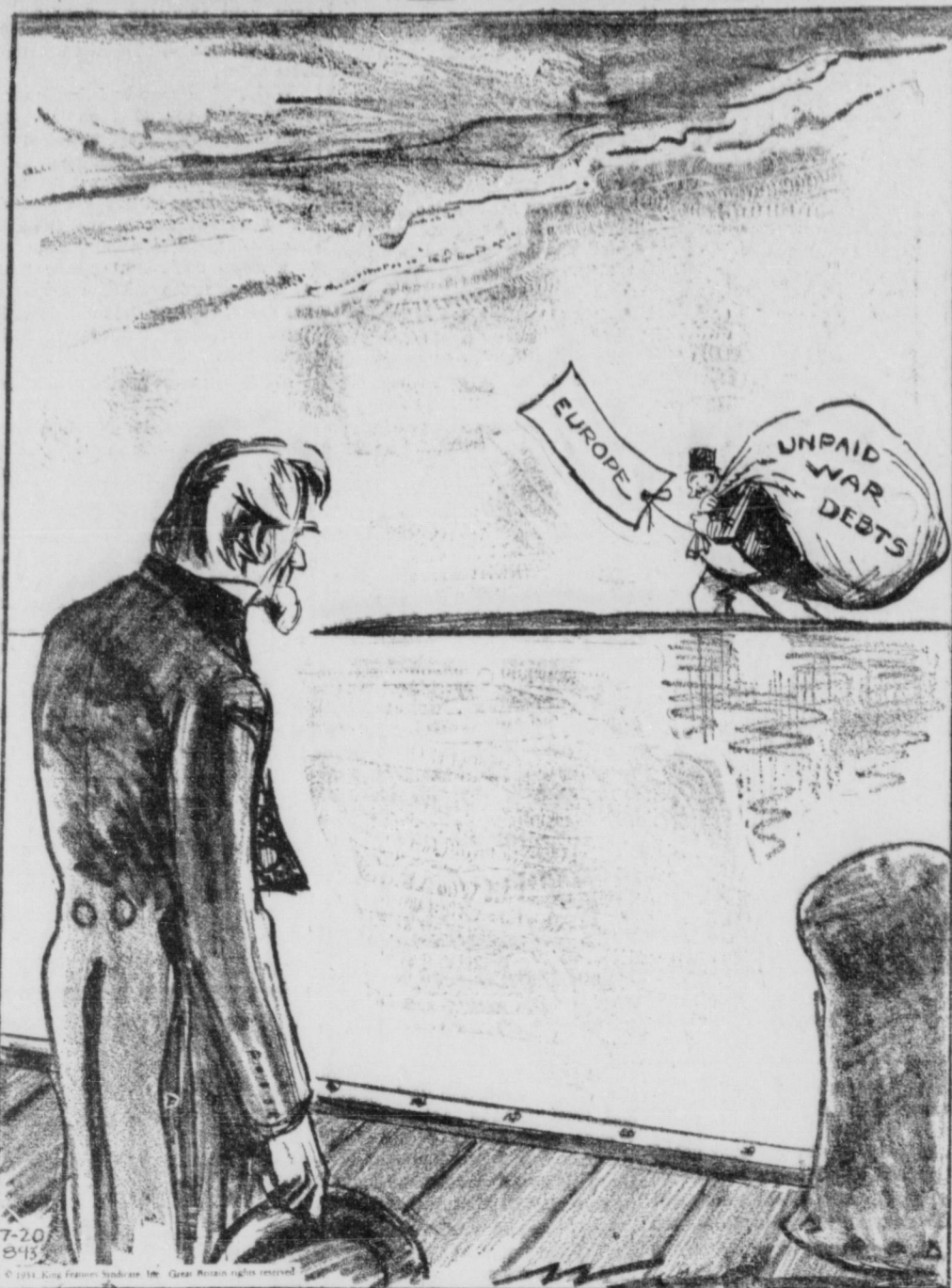

Delay Action  
Portland, Ore., July 20—(U.P.)—Labor, although incensed at Gov. Julius L. Meier's mobilization of 1,000 national guardsmen for possible duty on Portland's waterfront, will not call an immediate general strike.

After issuing a statement criticizing the governor's action and

terming it the "most monstrous thing that has happened in the waterfront strike," labor's strategy committee today renewed its promise to Senator Robert F. Wagner to give him a chance to attempt peaceful settlement before proceeding with a general strike. Wagner revealed this as he boarded a United Airlines plane for San Francisco.

Make Proposals  
Minneapolis, July 20—(U.P.)—Definite proposals for settlement of the four day old truck drivers strike were placed before employers and union men today by Father Francis J. Haas and E. H. Dunigan, federal mediators.

The nature of the proposals were not revealed.  
Father Haas reiterated his one and only public statement since negotiations started.  
"We appear to be making progress."
