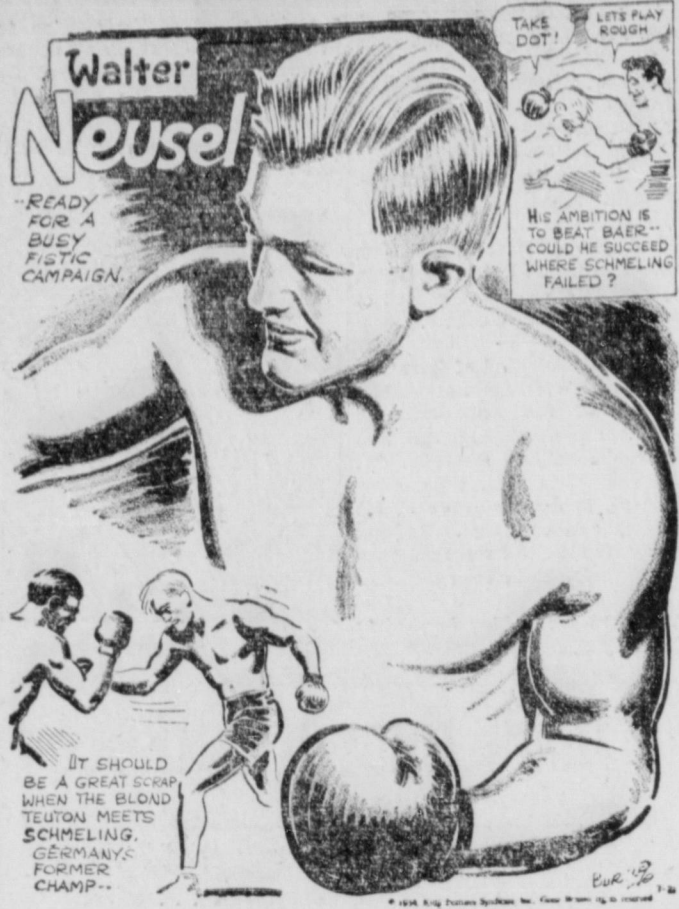

screaming threats from the sidewalk was dispersed. Several leaders were urging the crowd to "yank him out and shoot him at sunrise."

Langer is under an 18 months prison sentence for forcing federal employees to contribute to a political fund. He was represented by friends as being determined to retain his office by any possible means until his appeal is decided on by the federal court of appeals.

Langer supporters also stood outside the homes of the supreme court justices chanting "We want Langer." In more than one group there rose shouts of "lynch them—tar and feathers."

Olson, plaintively complaining that he should "be out on the farm looking after the hay instead of wasting time on all this tomfoolery," ignored all demonstrations.

He hasn't any revolutionary plans for state government, he said, but intends to fight right up to the next election time to prove his right to hold the governor's office.

GIANT PITCHER TAKES 9 IN ROW

Hal Schumacher Shuts Out Cincinnati; Cubs Also Win

New York, July 20.—(U.P.)—If Dr. Wirt or Rep. Ham Fish or any other red-chaser would like a few points from a fellow who never misses, they might drop around at the Polo grounds some afternoon and have a chat with a young man named Hal Schumacher.

Schumacher completed another excursion against the Reds yesterday afternoon, and his average is still 1.000. He has not, in his major league career been reversed by Cincinnati.

It is a creditable record. Incidentally, yesterday's victory enlarged the suspicion growing in the minds of many profound baseball thinkers, that it will take a lot of beating to keep the Giants away from another pennant. Since their crack-up in Chicago a month ago, the champions have won seven straight series. They have lost only one—to the Cubs—in the last twelve.

Four double plays helped Schumacher shut out the Redlegs, 4-0. He was reached for 13 hits, but the Reds couldn't put them together.

Chicago beat the Phillies, 2-1, behind the four-hit pitching of Malone and Wareneke. The Cubs still are three games behind the Giants. Dizzy Dean turned on his 17th victory of the season for St. Louis, beating Boston, 4-2, scoring the winning run with a long fly in the sixth.

Thus Frey won a ball game for Brooklyn almost single handed. His long fly tied the score in the fifth and his homer won in the ninth, 4-2, over Pittsburgh. Ben Chapman was the big noise in New York's triumph over Chicago, knocking a single, double and triple. His double in the eighth scored Coombs and Saltzger to win, 4-3.

Cleveland scored five runs in the ninth to defeat Boston, 6-5. Trosky's triple drove in Averill and Vosmik with the winning runs.

St. Louis drove Monte Weaver from the hump in the sixth, overtaking a five-run lead and winning over Washington, 8-7. Manager Rogers Hornsby drove Hemsley hoe with the winning marker. Detroit and Philadelphia were washed out.
