HOLMAN. The family name "Holman" is of English origin. One source of the name is the English and Scandinavian name "Hole", which means "dweller at a hollow". Another source is the Anglo-Scandinavian "Holm", which means "dweller on a river island." The latter name has a second significance, being derived from the middle English "holen" (holly-tree) and indicating "a dweller at a holly-tree." "Holman" is believed to have been derived in some cases from the middle English "hole", meaning "holy", and to have originally borne the significance of "the holy man." "Hollyman", "Holliman", "Holloman", etc., are variations of "Holman." The Hundred Rolls contains the names of Walter Holloman and William Holman, of Lincolnshire, and of John Holman, of Kent.

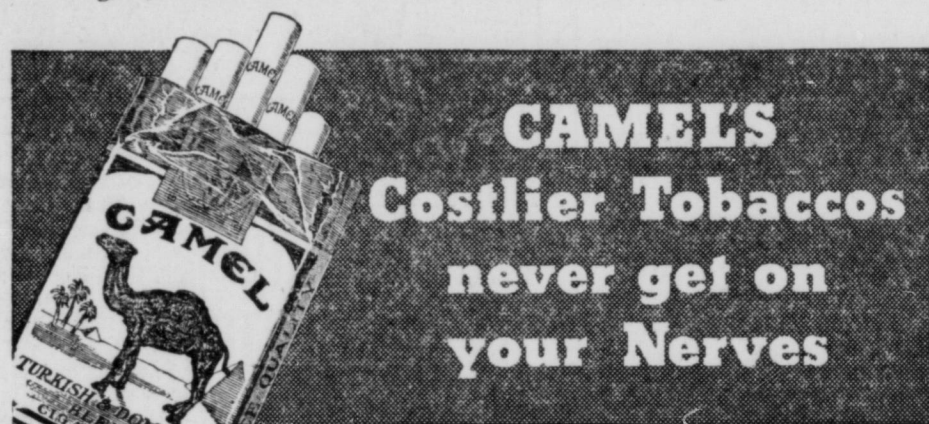

Two Ohio Women Die As Interurban Strikes Automobile

Auburn, Ind., July 30.—(U.P.)—Two persons were killed and three escaped with minor injuries yesterday when the automobile in which they were riding was struck by a southbound interurban at a crossing on state road 27 near here.

The dead are Mrs. Hazel Roth, 28, and Mrs. Eva Poling, 29, both of Van Wert county, Ohio. Injured slightly were their husbands, George W. Roth and Jesse Poling and the latter's son, Gene, 8.

Roth, driver of the car, told authorities he saw the interurban approaching some distance away, but that he did not know the road makes an abrupt turn across the tracks. He said he came to the crossing before he realized circumstances and tried to get across ahead of the electric train.

MRS. DALL IS GIVEN DIVORCE

President's Daughter Wins Decree In Reno, Nevada

Minden, Nev. July 30.—(U.P.)—Mrs. Anna Roosevelt Dall, the president's only daughter, today won an uncontested divorce from Curtis Dall, New York and Chicago broker.

Judge Clark Guild granted the decree after a brief hearing. Mrs. Dall charged "mental cruelty" based on marital incompatibility.

Mrs. Dall, deeply tanned, appeared unmoved as the verdict was announced. It terminated the married life of the parents of "Satie" and "Buzze", the famous White House grandchildren.

She paid no attention to newspaper men and a few residents of this quiet town who had come to the court house to see the president's daughter.

Mrs. Dall entered the courtroom at 11:05 a. m., and the bailiff locked the doors behind her party. No one else was admitted. Nine minutes later she emerged, divorced from Dall.
