Many folks voice objections to the corn-bog reduction program. Some say it wasn't the right thing to do. This plan would assist in control of erosion, of floods, reduced acres under cultivation, supply fuel and in time timber supply, and also a lot of work and perhaps grief also.

Some folks think that I am a calamity howler by trade. Its not that I do it for recreation.

It seems that another attack on the primary is impending. The

attack is based on the grounds economy. Now the money spent during a primary is beneficial is spread all over a county. A class of people get some, oil men, printers, restaurants, electric boards, etc. And the primary makes a government of the people. Who wants to live in Germany? There we have a government hand picked officials, and a person is in danger of losing his life for just a little criticism.
