became evident that there was no hope, her composure and courage returned and she died unflinchingly.
Mrs. Antonio was permitted the run of the death house corridor and not until 9 p. m., did the prison barber present himself to shave the crown of her head for the electrode.
When the barber finished, matrons bound her breasts in a brassiere, dressed her in a blue dress with white collar, and gave her a stocking for her right leg. The left remained bare for the electrode.
Then Father John P. McCaffery, prison chaplain, walked with her into the chapel-like execution chamber where pews were filled with official witnesses.
The priest prayed while the straps were tightened. The woman's face was composed; her eyes focussed on the wall above the witnesses' heads. The death mask was adjusted. The whine of the generator broke in on the prayer and the priest left the room to fetch the next victim. At 11:15 p. m., Robert W. Elliott, execution-
