PACKERS WILL RAISE WAGES

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE)

rell & Co., and the Rath Packing Co., of Waterloo, Ia., announced similar increases effective on the same date.

Officials of the packing companies attached no special significance to the simultaneous wage increases. Employees, they said, complained of the rising cost of living and asked restoration of

pay cuts taken in depression years.

In Chicago, where the major portion of the \$10,000,000 annual increase will be distributed, the meat packing industry's payroll was \$27,180,155 in 1930, or about 5.4 per cent of the entire industrial payroll of \$500,331,235 in the metropolitan area.

Packers said that the new increase puts the wages of packing house workers above those of 1929, despite shorter hours under the NRA packing code.
