FOOTBALL CARD IS ANNOUNCED

Northeastern Indiana Conference Schedules Are Announced

Football schedules for the 1935 and 1936 seasons were drawn at a meeting of officials and coaches of the Northeastern Indiana athletic conference held this week.

Decatur will play six conference games each season. Teams to be met next year are Bluffton, Auburn, Central, Garrett, South Side and North Side.

Eleven scheduled during 1936 are Auburn, Bluffton, Columbia City, North Side, Garrett and Central.

Decatur plays Bluffton, Auburn, Central, Garrett, South Side, North Side.

Garrett plays Auburn, Columbia City, Decatur, South Side, Bluffton.

North Side plays Central, South Side, Columbia City, Auburn, Decatur.

South Side plays Central, North Side, Garrett, Decatur, Bluffton.

FEATURE GAMES FOR SATURDAY

Pitt-Southern California And Stanford-Northwestern Standouts

New York, Oct. 12.—(U.P.)—Still jittery from last week's debacle, a score of important football teams pick up their gridiron tools tomorrow and move into new fields, with several of last Saturday's survivors having an excellent prospect of being planted in hot hills before the sun sets.

The two principal targets and possible victims of hangers-on from last week will be Pitt Panthers and Stanford on the Pacific coast. Pitt, unbeaten this year, enters a highly irked collection of young men from southern California, who were plastered last week by Washington State in the worst beating they have suffered since the late Knute Rockne's last great team knocked them off in 1930.

Northwestern, beaten last week, invades Stanford stadium at Palo Alto, thirsty for some sort of redress of their grievances. The Cards, although tied by Santa Clara, have not been beaten this year and are favored to win.

Two beaten giants clash in the mid-west—Purdue and Notre Dame. They were two of the most eminent victims of last week's tornado. Indiana, victim of Ohio State's ponderous crusher, leaves big ten environs for Philadelphia to try out Pop Warner's tricky set-up at Temple.

Only two games affect Big Ten standings—Chicago and Michigan, and Illinois and Ohio State. The Wolverines, although upset last week in another of the upheavals, should take the Maroons and the Buckeyes ought to wrap up Bob Zuppke's Illini.

Oregon and Washington clash in the major Pacific coast conference game, with the Webfooters expected to win. U. C. L. A. meets Montana in the breather. California will tackle what should be a set-up—Alonso Stagg's little college of the Pacific.

Latvian Archbishop Is Murdered Today

Riga, Latvia, Oct. 12.—(U.P.)—Archbishop Jozef, 58, of the Orthodox Catholic church was murdered today.

First reports said the crime was politically inspired but these were denied after investigation.

Fire broke out in the workshop of the Archbishop's home. He was a working carpenter. Firemen discovered his half burned body in the room. Police found that all the rooms in the home had been ransacked and held to the theory that robbery was the murderer's motive.

'Daddy' Browning Dies This Morning

Scarsdale N. Y., Oct. 12.—(U.P.)—Edward West (Daddy) Browning, 63, whose life, loves and eccentricities wrote a unit-ne chapter in America's "jazz age" died today of pneumonia at his Scarsdale home.

Only one of the numerous women who figured prominently in his life Dorothy (Sunshine) Browning Hood his adopted daughter—was at the bedside at the death of the millionaire real estate operator and playboy.

Browning was stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage last June, and was removed to his home a month ago.

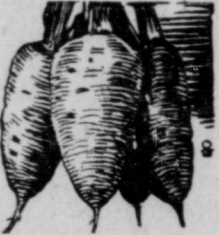
