Asks Committee To Study Tax Changes

Indianapolis, Nov. 22 —(UP)—Gov. Paul V. McNutt today asked seven organizations in the state to recommend one person from each to represent them on a committee to consider changes in the state gross income tax law.

Recommendations of the group will be submitted to the 1935 legislature, he said. The organizations to be represented are Indiana Farm Bureau; Indiana manufacturers association; Indiana Bankers Association; Indiana chamber of commerce; Association; Indiana Bankers Association; Indiana chamber of commerce; Associated retailers of Indiana; Indiana federation of labor; and Indiana real estate association.
