

## CHICAGO CUBS GET CARLETON

St. Louis Card Hurler Obtained In Trade For Two Pitchers

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 22.—(UPI)—A drive for championship timber by the Chicago Cubs was expected today to be the next big development of the National Association of professional baseball leagues.

The Cubs made the biggest deal of the opening day and were negotiating today in two more directions. The Cubs want action. Most of the other major league clubs can't make up their minds.

In last night's deal the Cubs obtained James O. (Tex) Carleton, right-handed pitcher, from the St. Louis Cardinals. They gave in exchange pitchers Bud Timming and Dick Ward and some cash. Carleton won 16 games and lost 11 for the Cardinals last season and, next to the Dean boys, was the ace of the St. Louis staff. Timming won 4 and lost 6 for the Cubs, while Ward won 13 and lost 4 for the Los Angeles club after failing to make the grade with the Cubs in the spring.

The Cubs have offered pitcher Guy Bush and outfielder Babe Herman to Pittsburgh for pitcher Larry French and outfielder Freddy Lindstrom, an even swap, no cash involved. The Pirate crew, from Manager Pie Traynor up and down, has been weighing the deal for 12 hours but still was undecided about it today. They promised to give their decision to Manager Charlie Grimm of the Cubs by tonight.

The Cincinnati Reds purchased two minor league stars from the Cardinal chain, third baseman Lew Riggs from Columbus and outfielder Ivan Goodman from Rochester, for a sum said to be \$40,000. The first major league trade last night sent outfielder Bruce Campbell from the St. Louis Browns to Cleveland for pitcher Bob Weiland, infielder Johnny Burnett and cash.

The Chicago White Sox outbid two other clubs, Detroit and Brooklyn, to get outfielder Vernon (George) Washington from the Indianapolis American Association club. The Sox gave \$20,000, pitcher Phil Gallivan and third baseman Billy Sullivan, who played with Milwaukee last year, for Washington, who hit .368 and lost the American Association batting title by one point. After obtaining Sullivan Indianapolis traded him to St. Paul for third baseman Otto Bluge.

Pari-Mutuel Betting May Be Ruled Legal

Indianapolis, Nov. 22.—(UP)—Pari-mutuel betting on horse races in Indiana will be legalized by the 1935 general assembly, it was reported here today on good authority.

There is a possibility that dog racing also will be permitted on the pari-mutuel betting basis, it was said.

The state board of agriculture is working on a model bill to be introduced in the 1935 session. The board is anxious to have such a law enacted so that it will be able to clear up a bonded indebtedness of approximately \$900,000 on the state fair. The present board has made the fair pay but the indebtedness was inherited from previous administrations.

construction projects started this year have been furnished although several will be held over until the 1935 program for completion, Adams said.



increased the price of soy beans to one dollar a bushel.

"We want the growers, within normal trucking distance of Decatur, or that territory covered by the sugar beet fieldmen to bring their beans to the local plant. Although we have a large supply on hands, we wish to give our friends in this section the opportunity of a ready market for their beans and will pay what the product is worth."

"We believe in cooperating with the farmer and beet grower and with the opening of the Central Soya plant are making a continuous market and stabilized price for the farmers of this area," Mr. McMillen declared.

Growers who have beans to sell were asked to get in touch with the Central Sugar company's fieldmen, located at the following places: E. L. Harlacher, Decatur; David Campbell, Bluffton; Harry Essex, Monroe; Ben Chilcoet, Ohio City; William Sheppelman, Monroe; Harry Daniels, Convoy; Harry Overmeyer, Woodburn; Joe Ebescote, Fort Jennings; J. E. Harlacher, Union City.

### Place In Market

With the opening of the soy bean mill, Decatur will be recognized as one of the principal bean markets in this part of the country. The same is true with sugar beets. The local sugar beet plant, owned by Mr. McMillen and associates, is the only beet plant in

Indiana and the local beet market is one of the outstanding ones in the central west.

Building of the soya plant started about September 24 and the completion of the mill and mammoth storage facilities in such a short period of time is considered one of the feats of modern construction work.

A. Wallace in which the cabinet member appealed to Indiana farmers to "unite behind the President in support of the agricultural adjustment act."
