or but before they could act the crash occurred.

Hammer was driven back from the plane by the flames. It was half an hour before the fire could be checked.

It was Dr. Carmack's second airplane ride, but Dr. Mendenhall and

his daughter had flown many times.

The two physicians flew to Richmond yesterday morning, picked up Miss Mendenhall and took her with them to Detroit where they addressed a Wayne county, (Michigan) medical meeting. They were returning to Richmond when the crash occurred.

Miss Mendenhall apparently had a premonition of death before she boarded the plane. Half joking and half serious, she bade her fellow reporters goodly remarking, "I hope I come back this way."

RECOVERY HEAD DEFENDS POLICY

In their government and in themselves to stop complaining and put their shoulders to the wheel. The man who spends his days and nights in finding fault with every public official, in sneering at every effort to serve the general welfare, and then howls for something to give confidence, ought to spend a few minutes every day looking at himself in a mirror and asking himself what he is doing to inspire anyone with any confidence in him.

He staunchly defended the Roosevelt administration in its speedy approach to the battle against the depression and credited the course pursued with the "peaceful rise from the depths."

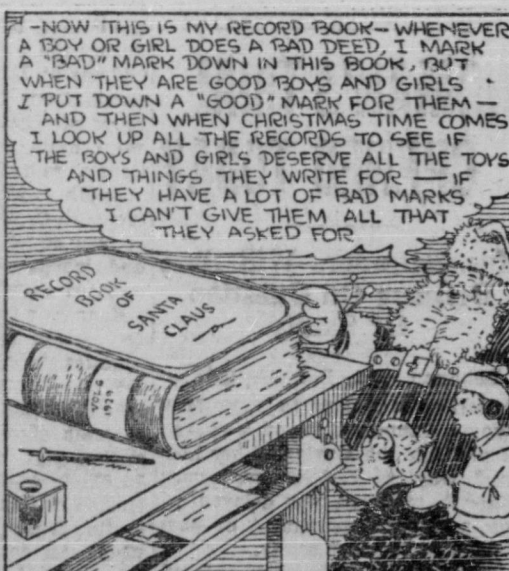
An opposite viewpoint was taken by Dr. Virgil Jordan, president of national industrial conference board. He charged that the government is in fact in the hands of an organized mob.

Jordan spoke before the congress of American industry.

"This is the last call for recovery on the basis of private enterprise," he said, "and unless it is answered decisively in the next six months, it will be too late."

He defined cooperation with government as "cooperation in the expansion of government employer and investor activity as the basis of recovery."
