JUDGMENT IS AWARDED FOR MRS. FISHER

basis of reversal of former decisions and making the award follows:

"Decedent was discovered in the spray pool, was thrown a board, which he failed to grasp, and was drowned. The court says decedent was where his duty called him, and where he had a right to be, and under the instructions given him, should have been. Where an employee is charged with the performance of a specific duty, and is found injured at a place where such duty called him, there is a legal presumption that he was injured as the result of and in the course of his employment. There is overwhelming evidence to show that at the time of his death he was on his master's premises for the purpose of performing a duty necessary to his employment. All the evidence without contradiction says that he was drowned doing one of two things directly connected with the service he was employed to perform. Award reversed with instructions to enter award for \$100 funeral expenses and compensation at \$16.50 a week for 300 weeks."

Water works park. It contains six acres. In addition to furnishing the ground for the Decatur Light and Power Company buildings, it contains the municipal swimming pool. Many picnics are also held there each year.

The third city park is the Memorial park on Winchester street. This park containing 1.99 acres was formerly the Decatur cemetery. About ten years ago the bodies in the old cemetery were moved to the Maplewood cemetery and the grounds were converted into a park. The athletic field at the corner of Adams and Thirteenth street contains 6.5 acres. A fence has been erected around a portion of it where baseball, football, track and other sport contests are held. Two tennis courts were built there last

year and the grounds improved by FERA labor.

The Decatur school board, which owns the land, has proposed that it be called the Martin F. Worthman Athletic Field. It will be dedicated when the board finds the proper time for the program.

Softball and tennis players are making the South Ward park one of the most popular in the city. This park is owned by the city and leased to the school board. It contains 5.703 acres. The city water department has dug several wells on the ground to eliminate the possibility of future water shortage.
