supreme court.

"It is my belief that the supreme court declared the section invalid because the congress merely authorized the president to regulate the interstate shipment of petroleum and its products," said Disney. "If we were to pass a bill that directed the president to control interstate shipments, I am confident we would have no trouble with the court."

Disney said his proposed bill would be divided into three sections:

1. The old Disney-Thomas bill

which would place production of crude oil under the control of the federal government for a two-year period. This is a temporary measure designed to stabilize the industry until the "head" is off the huge East Texas field which is causing most of the trouble in the industry.

2. State compacts to control oil production.

3. Re-enactment of section 9-C of the recovery act in a constitutional manner.

## Bangs Continues To Defy Order Of Court

Huntington, Ind., Jan. 8.—(UP)—Undaunted by extension of a restraining order against virtually all regular city employees, Mayor C. W. H. Bangs continued today to supervise installation of municipal electric service from a hideout.

The mayor is hiding to prevent Sheriff O. E. Johnson from serving him with the restraining order. The order was obtained in circuit court by the Northern Indiana Power company in the effort to prevent extension of city light plant service to residential users.

As the order is extended to additional city firemen, the mayor organizes new crews to carry on his night work.
