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PHOTOGRAPH AS MOONEY ALIBI

California Judge Says Photograph Of Prisoner Genuine

San Francisco, Oct. 2—(UPI)—A photographic alibi, center of almost as much controversy as the question of guilt or innocence of Tom Mooney, was presented in a new light today in an attempt to strengthen Mooney's latest bid for freedom.

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Man Sentenced For Attacking Woman

South Bend, Ind., Oct. 2—(UPI)—Elmer Traver, 39, was under a 10-year sentence in the state prison today after pleading guilty to attacking Mrs. Carrie Goeten, 64-year-old widow last July.

Mrs. Goeten was struck over the head and beaten with a glass candlestick holder. Traver fled from the house but was captured a few hours later.

Mankey Infant Dies Early This Morning

Bonnie Lou Mankey, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Mankey, residing two and one-half miles west of Peterboro in Adams county, died at 3 o'clock this morning at the home of her parents. She had been ill since birth.

She was born in Adams county on September 8, 1935, a daughter of Forrest and Nettie Frauniger-Mankey, natives of Adams county. Surviving are the parents, five brothers and five sisters.

Funeral services will be held

Thursday morning at 10 o'clock at the home of the parents with Rev. Dan Byerly in charge. Burial will be made in the Pleasant Dale cemetery.
